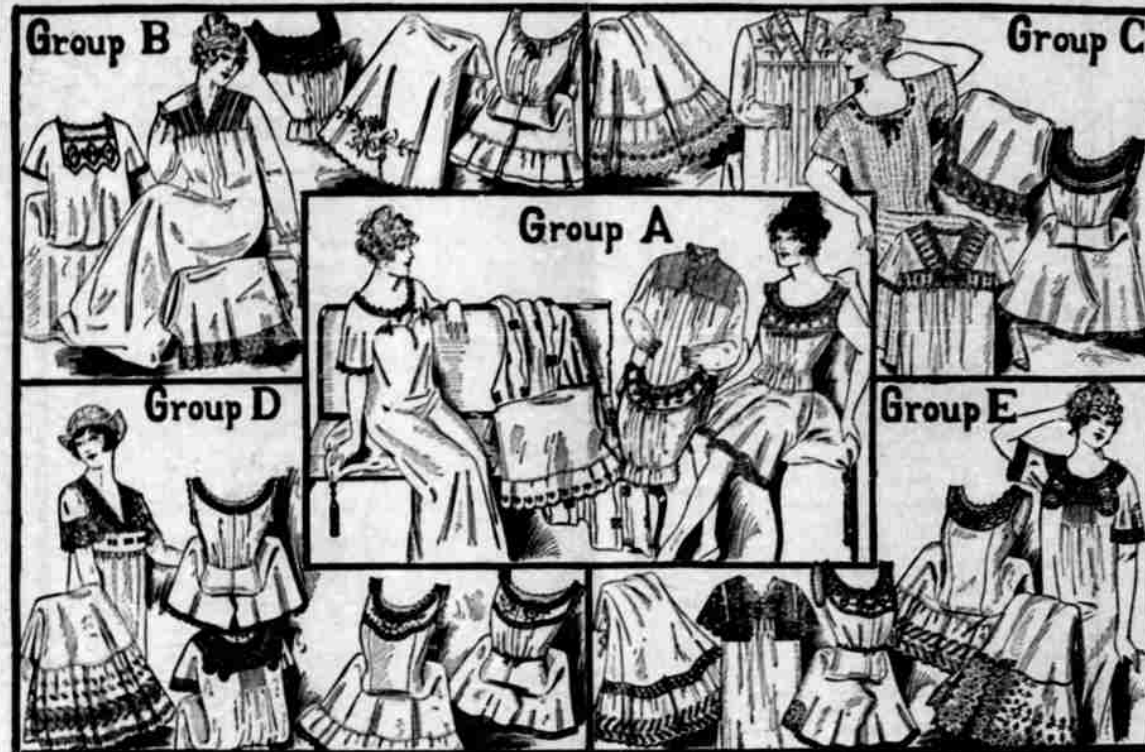

The Italian Fight.

Rome, June 14.—Partial destruction of the Russian fortress of Malborget in the Carnic Alps and continued heavy fighting about Goritz is reported at the war office by General Cadorna.

During the bombardment by the Italian artillery Sunday one wing of the Malborget fortress was blown up when the bursting shells caused the magazine to explode. Goritz is being attacked at three sides by the Italians. Furious fighting is in progress on the East bank of the Isonzo.

Renewed Fighting.

(By United Press Association) Paris, June 14.—Renewed German attacks were launched against Souchez. Powerful explosives were hurled against the French lines which wrecked a part of the trenches north of Sugar Mill, but the fighting continues with the result still in doubt, the official dispatches stated. On the eastern ridge of Lorette hills, the French occupied a portion of the German trenches, the Communiqué stated.

French Steamer Sunk.

London, June 14.—The French steamer Diamant was torpedoed and sunk off Cornwall on Sunday. The crew was rescued.
