NOISES OF WAR.

That the present war is a little different from all wars, a little louder and altogether more severe, is the concensus of opinion of writers, who go to the details of experiences. The following told by a correspondent to the Democrat, tells of the noises of war in a thrilling manner:

It's a blatter and crash, a spit and screech, and "Hell let Loose" doesn's half describe the noise of combi rifle, machine gun shell fire and bomb in this day and age," said a soldier back from the battlefront of Northern France today.

"If anyone could properly describe modern battle Dante's picture of Inferno would represent peace in con-trast," he added, explaining the sound that the modern soldier's ear has com-

"German fire sounds different fron the British and there are a thousan different individual sounds to break the stillness. Distant rapid fire reminds one of the purring of a power The German bulle: ful motor car. "cracks" and the British sounds like the bursting of a soft paper bag. Some times a German bullet richocheting it the sand "bizzes"; sometimes its lightning flight sounds like a man hal whistling, half hissing through his teeth. Glancing off metail it "pings" then "screeches" until it stops. Passing close by a bulle: gives a "crack" and it may deafen the nearest ear for days Like their rifle shots the German mashine guns sound less muifled than the Brititsh. They sound like the infinitely swift rapping of a door knock-er. Ours might be linked to a carpe being beaten by very dexterous and energetic spring cleaners armed with

"The sounds of shell fire are varied The German's "pipe squeak" and some times scream "Little Willie." High explosive shells are fickle; sometimes they burst with a blinding flash and little sound and again they crack like a thunderbolt. Some shells "whirtle" and some pass through the air like moaning wind. Anti-aircraft guns "ping-ping" and the bursting of their shrapnel most often "clatters"; but if it is lyddite it crashes like a collapsing brick smoke stack.

"Night sounds in the trenches are many and varied. A sentry's trained ears may eatch the sound of shoveling with spades and the tap of a mallot on wooden stakes. This comes when the enemy's trench is near and denotes that he is driving a sap, digging an advance trench, or constructcomes the whir of a dynamo. It is a sure sign that the enemy is work ing an electrical trench digger. If the trenches are close one may hear the movements of enemy reliefs or reinforcements behind their lines. It is generally possible to hear sounds of guns or transport being made. On a quiet night this sound is audible for miles. It's the same with the human voice. The sentry is sometimes greeted with good English from Ger man trenches or with a song. The strange sacred cries of flying lapwings, the mewing of homeless cats and the whining of dogs are but few of the wierd sounds that greet the lonely sentry at night. The novice has often been rudely scared by the snoring song of a soldier-pal at peace with the whole world, the Germans
