Advertisement for Street Improve-
ment.

Sealed bids will be received by the
Council of the City of Albany, Ore-
gon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. June 23,
1915, for the improvement of Pine
Street from the south line of Salem
Road to the north line of Santiam
Road, in the City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the
following manner, to-wit:

First: By grading said street to the
required grade and subgrade.

Second: By graveling said street
six inches deep and eight feet wide.

Said improvement to be made in ac-
cordance with the charter and ordi-
nances of the said City of Albany, and
the plans, specifications and estimates
of the City Engineer on file in the
offices of the City Recorder, where
plans may be seen and specifications
and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 p. m.
June 23, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be con-
sidered unless accompanied by a cer-
tified check payable to the City of
Albany in an amount equal to five
per cent of the aggregate bid, to be
forfeited as fixed and liquidated
damages in case the bidder neglects
or refuses to enter into a contract
and provide an approved bond in the
sum of \$100 for the faithful perfor-
mance of the work within ten days
after notification of award of contract
to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view
of completing the construction of said
improvement prior to the 1st day of
August, 1915, under a liquidated pen-
alty for damages of \$2.50 for each day
of delay beyond that period.

The Council reserves the right to
reject all bids deemed unreasonable.
