BETTER SITUATION.

Duns: While general business gains but slowly, the economic situation grows steadily stronger. International uncertainties are still a restraining influence, yet constructive forces multiply, and the absence of speculative excesses is helpful to sustained progress. Much of the best feature of the week was the government grain report, which indicated bumper harvests of both wheat and oats, as well as big yields of the other cereals. To the nation at large agricultural success means more than any one can calculate, and since the prosperity of the railroads is materially affected by the size of the crops to be moved, the official forecast is obviously a most encouraging factor. Because of it optimism in the west increases and confidence everywhere strengthens, especially as the marketing of the great staples will involve no financial strain. Funds remain in superabundant supply for all requirements, and gold is coming here when it is not really needed, several millions of the precious metal again crossing the Canadian border this week. It is not now uncommon to hear of idle plants resuming or of more machinery being set in motion, and unemployment becomes a less serious problem as industrial operations expand. In no other quarter has the revival of activity been as pronounced as in iron and steel, where production is rising nearer to the point of capacity without any evidence of accompanying price inflation.

People are becoming accustomed to record crops, but talk of a possible wheat harvest of 950,000,000 bushels rather staggers the imagination. Recent sensational stories of damage in the Southwest were not confirmed by the official returns, which exceeded the most optimistic expectations. Much encouragement was also afforded by the outlook for both oats and corn, while the other cereals likewise promise well. Steadily declining grain prices reflect the splendid agricultural prospects. Cotton is also easier, but the general tendency of the leading commodities was upward this week. 29 recessions and 39 advances appearing in the 321 quotations regularly compiled by Dun's Review.

Although no material increase in the volume of orders is apparent, a better tone has developed in the primary cotton goods markets. Recent cool weather militated against activity in wash goods and white goods, yet business in these cloths has been better than a year ago. The large foreign demand for cotton duck continues, and more than 4,000 rolls have been sold within a week. While many contracts for staple dress goods are in hand, duplicate purchasing for fall is confined to actual needs and is developing in small lots. Prices are higher, as a rule, and it is expected that further advances will be asked for the next season, owing to the enhanced cost of wool and the scarcity of dyestuffs.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. June 23, 1915, for the improvement of Pine Street from the south line of Salem road to the north line of Santiam road, in the City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner, to-wit:

First: By grading said street to the required grade and subgrade.

Second: By graveling said street 18 inches deep and eight feet wide.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the said City of Albany, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder, where same may be seen, and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 p. m. June 23, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$100 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view to completing the construction of said improvement prior to the 1st day of August, 1915, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$2.50 for each day of delay beyond that period.
