Time Loans at 4 Per Cent,
Endorsed.

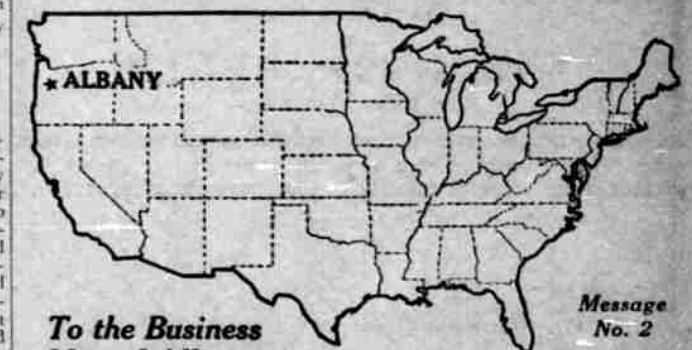

GREAT PEACE CONFERENCE IN INDEPENDENCE HALL

Philadelphia, June 17.—A world-wide peace conference convened here today in historic Independence Hall to consider the formation of a League of Nations. Fostered by Ex-President William Howard Taft, who will preside at the meeting, the conference is said to have the unofficial endorsement of President Wilson.

The movement is regarded as the most definite step yet taken toward international amity. Attending the conference are over 100 prominent men of this country—pub-

lic officials, international law experts, humanitarians and presidents of universities.

The conference was called not merely for the purpose of discussing abstract questions of peace and arbitration, but to put squarely before the conference a proposition for the United States to join a peace league composed of every great nation. The league is intended to bind the signatories to agree to certain definite lines of international action, the most important of which is that the powers joining the league utilize their joint military forces to prevent any one of their number going to war precipitately.

Two other proposals will be submitted for the conference considera-

tion. One provides for the creation of an international judicial tribunal and the other aims to create an international council of conciliation—which has not been discussed hitherto—for questions that are known as non-justiciable, or those not considered triable in a judicial tribunal.

LINCOLN COUNTY EXPECTS TO SHIP COAL SOON

It Is Already Being Taken Out
With Capacity Now of Ten
Tons a Day.

The News of Newport gives the following:
To reach the location of the coal vein Mr. Carpenter has just completed a piece of road work at a cost of about \$700, which gives him a good road from his mine to Toledo, or even to Newport as needs be. He has carried on development work on the vein until there is now a good, clean working vein in sight 40 inches deep and it will apparently grow deeper as it is tunneled into.

A large quantity of coal has already been taken out and during the first of the week Mr. Carpenter was busily engaged putting in a washing screen, and will begin the delivery of coal at Toledo later in the week. An experienced miner now at work there states that, even with the limited amount of development done at this time, ten tons of coal per day can easily be taken out.

Death Wins Right of Way.

Cripple Creek, Colo., June 17.—Death defeated Robert J. McNamara, 70, and now a great railroad will push its lines through his property after years of delay through McNamara's implacable opposition. On several occasions he drove railroad gangs off with a shot gun.

McNamara was one of the oddest characters ever known in these parts. At death he was a trapper, prospector, gambler and hermit. He came here thirty years ago and his experience included successful mine owner, stage robber and convict. For robbing a stage he served 10 years of a 14 year sentence in the Colorado penitentiary.

The body of the old man was found in his lonely cabin, death having come from natural causes with the aid of starvation. He had for some time protested the right of way of a railroad near his retreat.

The New Grand Patriarch—

At Portland last night a reception was given Robert Andrews, grand patriarch of the grand encampment of the grand lodge of Oregon Odd Fellows. When he took his seat there was a shower of roses on him from all over the hall, a striking demonstration of appreciation. Mr. Andrews was grand master in 1902 and has occupied many prominent positions since. He is a former Halsey man, well known in Albany.
