(By United Press Association) Washington, June 21.—Serious charges of abuse of the American flag by the allies has been made to the state department by Germany, it is learned. A report was asked from the American embassy at London, but nothing has yet been heard from Ambassador Page. It is learned authoritatively that Germany cited the flying of other neutral flags by disguised British ships combing the seas for German submarines.

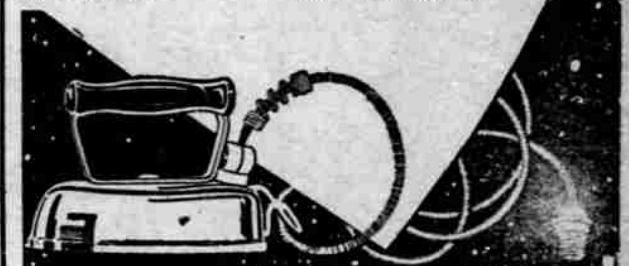
