A fair run of sheep for the week with prices lower and market inactive. Spring lambs are coming in small consignments only. Choice lambs are selling at \$7.50, ewes \$5 and wethers at \$5.50.

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G. C. STORER ACCIDENTLY SHOT THIS MORNING

Corvallis Man Meets With Accident on Mother's Farm Near Oakville.

A sad accident occurred near Oakville on the Oregon Electric about seven miles south of the city at 6:30 this morning when Granville C. Storer shot and killed himself with a .22 calibre rifle.

Mr. Storer had a prolonged attack of the mumps last January, and this later brought on sciatic rheumatism, and it was while recovering from this trouble that he was visiting at the home of his mother, Mrs. A. R. Storer. To pass the time away he had the rifle for target practice, and this morning he went out on the porch and saw a pheasant that had been causing a great deal of trouble of late and made the remark that he was going to shoot it. No one saw the accident, but it is thought that in picking up the gun from the porch his weak leg gave way and he fell in such a manner as to discharge the gun, the bullet penetrating the right side of the head and ranging upward. Dr. Perrot was called, but the man died about two hours after the accident.

Coroner Fortmiller decided the case accidental and no inquest was held.

He is survived by a wife, two children, his mother, two brothers, W. P. and W. B. Storer, and two sisters in California and Nebraska. The funeral will probably be held Thursday, and burial will take place at Riverside cemetery.

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126 Indicted By Grand Jury.

(By United Press Association) Indianapolis, June 22.—Thomas Taggart, former chairman of the National Democratic committee, Mayor Joseph Bell, Chief of Police Perrott, 125 other Indianapolis citizens were indicted by the county grand jury, charged with conspiracy to commit 48 felonies in the recent county primary registration and election. The grand jury will vote additional true bills this afternoon when it is understood other prominent politicians will be indicted.
