750,000 A MONTH.

The record of the war so far is startling. An exchange has figured out the following facts:

The British dead, wounded and missing up to May 31 numbered 258,000. The total had almost doubled in seven weeks, and the figures will run up still more rapidly as the army is brought to its full strength and assumes its share of the fighting.

Serbia has lost about an equal number of men. Belgium's losses are given as about 200,000. German casualties are estimated by careful observers at perhaps 2,225,000. There can be little doubt that German and Austrian losses together up to the end of May aggregate at least 3,000,000. Russia's losses are thought to be about 2,300,000, those of France 1,500,000 and those of the Turks, South Africans, East Africans and others, 100,000.

This gives a grand total of 7,600,000. It is reckoned that about 1,500,000 have been killed, 4,500,000 wounded and the rest—given as "missing"—are for the most part prisoners of war. Russia particularly has lost an enormous number of men as prisoners.

This estimate means that for the first ten months of the war the average loss has been 750,000 per month. It is easy to see that but little more than two years of such warfare—say until the fall of 1916—will eliminate all the regular military forces existing in the belligerent countries when the war began. After that, if the war continues, they would depend on their "unorganized strength," consisting of all the men of any age able to perform military duty in extreme need. That would provide enough men to keep the death mill grinding for three years longer. Then, in theory, there wouldn't be a single able-bodied man left in any of the warring countries.

Of course, this reckoning takes no account of the large numbers of wounded men who return to the front after convalescence, and of the missing who rejoin their colors or appear in later lists and so are counted twice. The growing fierceness of the struggle, however, in the next few months may more than balance whatever discount must be allowed to these particulars.

Seven hundred and fifty thousand men a month—thus the manhood of Europe is being cut down by bullet, bayonet and shrapnel, every victim suffering keen pain and leaving a train of anguish and sorrow. Seven hundred and fifty thousand families, every month, grieving for a man killed, wounded or lost. Seven hundred and fifty thousand strong male bodies swept away in fire and blood, and another 750,000 coming forward to take their places.

THE WAR TRUST.

The war trust does not confine its operations to the Christian nations, but gathers the pagan governments into its net as well, says Congressman Tavenner. The arm of the war trust is long. It has reached across the Pacific and laid hold of Japan.

Vice Admiral Koichi Fujii, formerly Japanese naval attaché at Berlin, was ordered before a court martial, convicted, and sentenced to four years and six months imprisonment, charged with having received illicit commissions for influencing the allotment of admiralty contracts in favor of a German war trafficking firm. Capt. Swasaki was sentenced to one year for the same offense. Vice Admiral Tsurutaro Matsuo, inspector general of naval construction, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Vice Admiral Matsumoto was sentenced to three years in prison. Vice Masuji Yamanouchi, vice admiral of the reserve and member of the Japanese house of peers, whose name was mentioned in naval scandals, attempted

hara-kiri.

In the last year and a half Japan has had army and navy scandals that have shaken it to the core. There have been arrests, court martials, convictions, imprisonments, and attempted suicides of high military officers, all due to the fact that profit has not been taken out of war and preparation for war.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 p. m., June 23rd, 1915, for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in Ferry Street trunk sewer where same connects with Twelfth Street and running thence easterly along said Twelfth Street parallel with and sixteen feet from the south line thereof 152 feet to the intersection with the center line of the alley through Block "A" Central Addition; thence southerly along the center line of said alley and the extension thereof 25 feet to a point in the street or road running southwesterly and northeasterly and 8 feet from the northwesterly side thereof; thence southwesterly along said street or road, parallel with and eight feet from the northwestern side thereof 30 feet, and being a total distance of 432 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder, where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.
