Austrians Repulsed.

Rome, June 25.—The Austrian fortress of Melborget is now surrounded and the town is being subjected to a heavy Italian bombardment. It is officially reported that the Italians have repulsed 30,000 Austrians north of Goritz.

Fighting Around Arras.

Paris, June 24.—Along the entire line from Arras to a point north of Bouchez, a violent cannonading has been in progress since early yesterday. An unsuccessful attempt was made by the Germans to throw back the French line near Dompierre. Several buildings in Arras were destroyed by the German bombardment, which killed several Sisters and nurses in St. Sacrament hospital.

Russians Admit Loss of Lemberg.

Petrograd, June 24.—Admission that Lemberg had fallen was made in an official statement. The Russians are retiring Eastward upon a new front, in perfect order, it is asserted. A battle has now begun along the river Sereth, and the Austrians are being reinforced and though the Russians were outnumbered they are declared to occupy positions of the greatest strategic importance. Few Russians were imprisoned at Lemberg.

French Advancing.

Paris, June 23.—The French are successfully pressing their advance in Alsace and Sondernach on the east bank of the Fecht river is occupied. It is officially announced. Terrific fighting is reported in progress at several points across France, through Flanders and on to the sea.

Nebraska Bryan's Home.

New York, June 24.—Mr. Bryan announced that he retained his residence in Nebraska and henceforth would live there part of each year and vote there. Politicians have regarded the announcement as significant in view of rumors of a possible fight to be made by Bryan for Hitchcock's seat in the senate. Bryan said he would continue the publication of the Commonwealth.

Six Killed by Earthquake.

Calexico, Calif., June 24.—Injuries sustained in an earthquake which damaged several Imperial Valley towns Tuesday night resulted in the death of Frank Smith, a violinist, in the hospital here, bringing the total death list to six. Smith was fatally hurt by a falling wall at Mexicali, across the border. The correct estimate of the damage isn't available but will probably be in the neighborhood of \$350,000.
