MARKET PRICES.

Perhaps never before have strawberries hung on as they have this year, nearly two months. Today they were being sold as low as 5c a box. Red and black caps and straight blackberries are plenty, about 5c.

Eggs are 18c, country butter 20 to 25c; creamery butter 27 1-2 to 30c. Flour ranges all the way from \$6.50 to \$7.10 a barrel, or \$1.50 to \$1.90 a sack.

Wheat is about 90c and oats 32c. Potatoes, new, are down to 2 1/2 cents a pound.

Hot house tomatoes are in the market at 15 cents a pound. They come from Eugene. The man who is raising them first came to Albany, but he said they wanted so much for suitable land for his business that he went to Eugene. They look fine.

Wool is close to 30c, and mohair about 42c.

Bacon ranges from 18c to 24c, and ham from 16c to 18c.

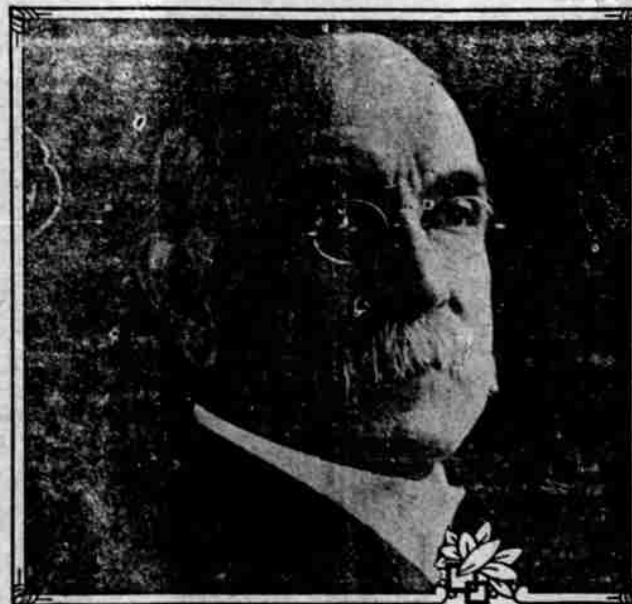
Beef on foot is 5 to 6 cents and lamb about 6 cents.

Green peas are 6 1-4 cents per pound.

NEW BUICK FOR 1916 ARRIVED HERE SATURDAY

New Six Cylinder Cars Make Immediate Hit With Automobile Public.

The second car to make its appearance among local garages for 1916 is the Buick, which arrived from Portland Saturday evening. J. L. Irvin, the local agent, and Al Senders, owner of the first 1916 Buick in Albany, drove up from Portland and are more than pleased with the performance of the new car. Not a change out of high gear was made on the entire trip, and Mr. Senders described the ride by saying it was just like floating up.

The new model is a beauty with its graceful stream line body, and is all in design that could be asked for. The car is built in seven models this year, from roadster to laundret coupe.

The Buick people are confining their output exclusively to sixes this year. The principal features are the same as last year with the valve-in-head motor with water cooling system. The ignition, lighting and self-starting systems are made a part of the engine and are of the Dolce type. The carburetor is of the automatic-feed type supplied with vacuum feed from tank on the rear of the car. The clutch, transmission and control devices are about the same as in the 1915 model.

The equipment is in keeping with the rest of the car. The electric lights are of the new style, double bulb type. No side lamps are on the car, to spoil the effect of the long graceful lines of the body.

Model D-45 sells for about the same price as last year's four cylinder and is a much greater value for the money. Mr. Irvin is justly proud of his new models and expects to have a record season.

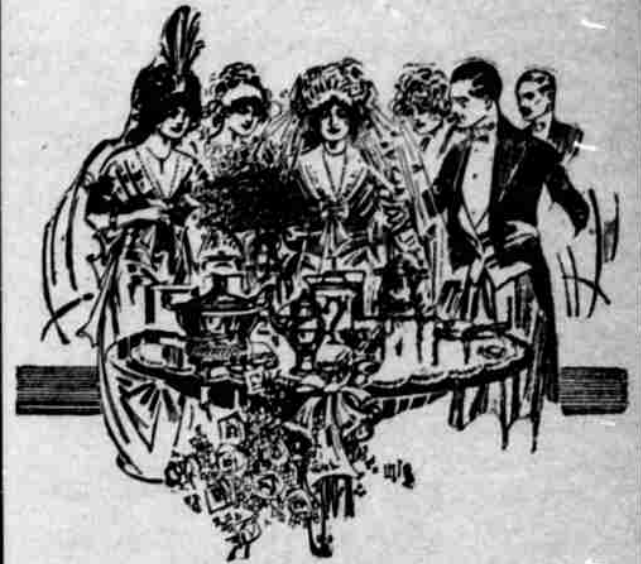

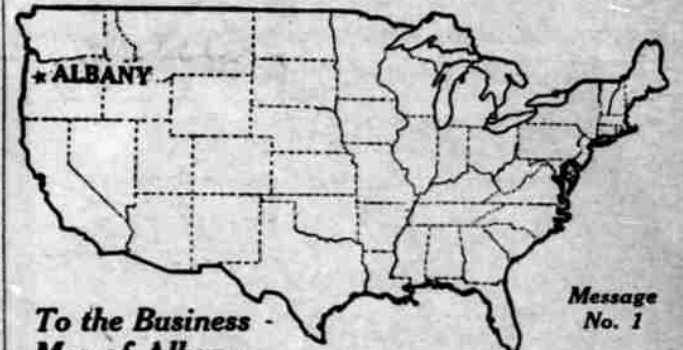

HALF OF LAKE CRYSTAL'S POPULATION NAMED JONES

Lake Crystal, Minn., June 28—More than half the population of this village are named Jones. About 1,000 persons reside here. Of these the great majority are Welshmen. Nearly all of them have been life long residents of this community, which was founded by two families, named Jones.

L. P. Jones is the cashier of the bank. Jack Jones is a liveryman. M. L. Jones is the lumberman. Hugh Jones sells furniture. Jones is an undertaker, and there are half a dozen Rev. Joneses. John A. Jones and Stanley Jones are restaurant keepers. Jack Jones is a baker and C. H. Jones makes harness.

"It's impossible to keep the mail straight when mail is addressed to 'John Jones.' It must bear the middle initial, and then it's hard to keep it straight. We have to give the Joneses nicknames to keep them straight," said Postmaster Marry M. V. Jones here today.
