STUDEBAKER ANNOUNCEMENT FOR 1916 RECEIVED HERE

Many Improvements Noted in New Model For Next Year In Specifications.

Advance information has just reached this office regarding the announcement of the Studebaker cars

for 1916. Announcements of 1916 cars have been coming thick and fast the past three weeks and none have been anticipated more than that of the popular Studebaker. The principal features of all the announcements have been the lowering of the price and the addition of more power, together with more features of refinement in the lines of the cars.

While more attention is given to the six by Studebaker this year they have by no means neglected the four cylinder car, and have increased its power to 41 1-2 horse power by enlarging the bore of their new motor

to 3 7-8 inches. The car will be bigger, more room and more powerful throughout.

One of the notable features of the cars is the new unique arrangement of the seats. The driver's seat, for example, is shaped so that both the driver and the passenger riding with him have separate seats. This is a change that owners who drive their own cars will greatly appreciate. The tonneau is roomier than ever, and the auxiliary seats are of entirely new design, developed by Studebaker within the last year. Instead of folding back against the sides of the car or up against the back of the front seat, they sink down into recesses in the floor, completely disappearing when not in use. And thus extra room and ease of entrance and exit from the tonneau is provided.

Exceptional care has been paid to the upholstery of the new cars. The leather used is the finest grade of genuine, hand-buffed leather on the market.

The principal feature and that of deepest concern to motorists is the greatly increased power of the new Studebaker motor. Brake tests on the four have developed 41 1-2 and on the six 54.5 horsepower.

This added power has been secured in one way by enlarging the bore of the motor to 3 7-8 inches. For another, the carburetor has been transferred to the left side of the motor, lessening the distance for the gas to travel and giving it freer passage. A separate intake manifold is another important factor in securing a wider range of ability for the motor.

The electrical system for starting and lighting the new cars is the well known Wagner two unit type, which was developed four years ago. The switches are rotary and have been placed on the instrument board with provision made for locking the ignition control.

Silence in the operation of the car has been another all important feature by various changes. Many changes in the timing and accessory drive gears, in the position of the generator and ignition distributor, the lengthening of the tail pipe of the muffler, using rubber bumpers wherever there might be a rattle, in fact in every place possible there have been improvements in the silence of operation.

The bodies of the new models are finished in what is becoming famous as "the Studebaker blue," its lasting richness having been attained only after extensive and costly experiment. This is set off with a pin stripe in white. The hood, the fenders and moldings are enameled in lustrous black. The spokes of the wheels are blue with black rims. Twenty-five different operations are required for the painters to finish a Studebaker car, but the striking effect secured goes far in substantiating the claim for a quality car.

Improvements are noted all over the car—in the clutch, the propeller shaft, a larger Timken bearing in the full-floating axles, larger brake drums, the wind shield, one man top, in fact every place. One of the new features that will interest the average motorist is a new rim, which has an

unique interlocking device that springs the tire off when it is desired to remove the casing.

The wheel base of the four has been increased to 112 inches. The seven passenger six wheel base is increased to 132 inches. The fours will be made in three and seven passenger bodies and three passenger Landau-roadsters. The six will be made in seven passenger touring bodies, three passenger roadsters, three passenger Landau-roadster, four passenger coupe and seven passenger limousine.

The factory announcement will appear in all leading newspapers of the country next Sunday and in the national magazines at the earliest possible date. Messrs. Wallworth and Cady of the Albany Garage have not been able to say when the first car will arrive, but it will be at an early date and its appearance will be watched for with great interest.
