An American Opera.

Los Angeles, July 1.—The long standing question of whether or not an American opera, in English, can be written to compare with the works of great European composers and librettists may be decided here tonight at the first production of "Fairyland," \$10,000 prize opera of the American Federation of Music Clubs.

Some of the greatest musicians and critics in the country have arrived here to attend the first production, for which practically no expense has been spared.

The opera's three act piece, is a central European setting of the 13th century, written by Horation Parker dean of music at Yale.

It is a chorus opera, and the music is said to bear an individuality distinctly apart from the modern and ancient schools of European opera. The work of producing it has been under the direction of Alfred Hertz for 13 years director of Wagnerian opera at the Metropolitan in New York.

Predictions are that it will be a big success.

Her back was badly strained. She and Miss Parsons were unconscious for some time. The latter besides being badly bruised, suffered the breaking of an arm and a collar bone. Mrs. Edholm was not injured, but the child was considerably bruised. Some men with them further out in the field, hastened to their aid, and they were taken to the Edholm place and Dr. B. R. Wallace sent for.

Anne brings the two little vagrants into the house and ultimately adopts them.

The subsequent efforts of Lon Cronk, aided by Everett, the adopted son of the Brimbecombs, to regain possession of the children, the thwarting of their plots and machinations by Horace Shellington, and the final restoration of the long lost twins to their rightful parents, make a screen story at once absorbing and thrilling.
