LET'S HAVE SMOKELESS SEASON IN VALLEY

Portland, July 2.—Features of forest protection in the Pacific Northwest this year are an appeal to the public for assistance in preventing the smoke nuisance which will otherwise prejudice the stream of visitors going to and from the Frisco exposition and a perfected system of dry wind forecasts by the U. S. weather bureau which will be used by all protective agencies. State officials and chambers of commerce are sending out thousands of letters emphasizing the importance of reducing the smoke evil.

Reports from June received by the Western Forestry & Conservation association, the clearing house for all private and official patrol systems from Montana to California, record practically no losses by forest fires up to date but not cessation of preparation for the danger months of July and August. Most of the patrol forces are already on and within a few days over 3000 will be on duty in the four northwestern states. Favorable weather in June has been used in pushing the building of trails and telephone lines.

July hazard to be guarded against, other than from the usual carelessness with matches, cigarettes and campfires, is reported to be chiefly in slash burning to clear land and rights of way and in leaving fires thus started to smoulder in logs and stumps to break out later in hot windy weather. Forest officers announce that state laws prohibiting burning without permit and prosecution will be enforced rigidly and also warn summer camping parties to be extremely careful with campfires.

WIFE OF NEGRO CLAIMS SHE IS WHITE

San Francisco, July 2.—Efforts of Mrs. William N. Lytle, wife of a negro dentist, to obtain an annulment of marriage on the ground that scientific blood test shows her to be a white woman, have stirred up a warm discussion among physicians and chemists here.

Professor Frederick P. Gay of the University of California, holds that there is no blood test which will determine whether a person has a trace of Ethiopian blood.

"All human blood, regardless of race, responds to the same reactions," declared Dr. Gay. "I proved this by a series of experiments at Harvard. If any man claims he can tell by a blood test the difference between a black man and a white, he is either faking it or he has discovered a process that will make him famous. We have not got far enough along to tell that difference between them yet."

"But we are able to tell the difference between human blood and animal blood. This is done by immunizing a rabbit against human blood and then testing the sample with the immunized blood several days later. If the rabbit's blood coagulates the sample it is human blood. This test is frequently used in the criminal courts."

"The only safe manner of telling whites from blacks is by comparing the color under the fingernails. This is the only method known to science."

Mrs. Lytle declared, however, that her physician has clearly established her race by means of a scientific blood test, so it seems probable that there will be a clash of scientists when the case gets to court.

Mrs. Lytle, who signs her complaints, Margaret Buckner, says she married Dr. Lytle when under the impression that she had negro blood in her veins. Taken from a convent by a negro "Mammy," she says she was raised firm in the belief that she was part

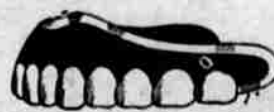
