SALEM LIKES ALBANY'S FORM OF PAVEMENT

State and City May Follow Lead of Marion County and Install Plants.

The fact that Albany is getting a good grade of pavement at a reasonable cost is evidenced by the fact that the Salem city council has made a careful study of the work being done on Second street and examined the streets paved last year and Councilman Hatch will report favorably on Salem's taking up the same plan. The following from this morning's Statesman tells the story:

"After making a trip to Albany where he inspected the new pavement being laid there by the city, H. W. Hatch, who probably will take charge of the paving work to be done by the state around the grounds of the several state institutions, returned yesterday. Mr. Hatch says that the pavement which has just been laid on Second street in the Hub City appears to be in first class shape and that the same kind will be excellent to use on the roads at the state institutions, he believes.

Cost But \$1.05 Yard.
The fact that the pavement as laid in Albany cost the taxpayers only \$1.05 a yard, in comparison with the greatly increased cost of patented pavements, has caused the state board of control to investigate the work being done at Albany with a view of having the same kind put down here. Marion county is already commencing to lay pavement of a like quality and the great saving effected has made the state board feel the advisability of adopting like material. The state has about 40,000 yards to lay this Summer and Fall if it is possible to make satisfactory arrangements and it is seen that the work can be done at a reasonable cost.

Use Convict Labor.

Under the plan contemplated, the state will use convict labor as far as possible in the paving, and this will help to cut down the cost, it is believed. If the facts are shown to justify the expenditure, the state may purchase a paving plant. A plant costs approximately \$8000 but after initial expenditure, it is thought that a great saving could be ultimately effected. It has been suggested that when the paving was completed around the state institutions in Salem, that the plant could be used to advantage in whatever paving might be found necessary at the Oregon Agricultural College grounds and other state institutions in different parts of the state.

Mr. Hatch will report to the members of the state board when they hold their next meeting concerning the character and cost of the paving laid at Albany.
