AT THE THEATRES.

Again we have with us the old favorite, Charley Chaplin, the comedy king, at the Globe today and tomorrow. Chaplin's vehicle this time is "By the Sea," one of his screamiest screams. Team Stolen.

Sheriff Bodine is in receipt of a notice from the Sheriff of Multnomah county asking the local officials to keep on the lookout for a team of horses and a black top buggy that were stolen in Portland Sunday. A man giving his name as Chas. Boyer, aged about 40, rented the team from a stable on the 4th, and has failed thus far to return. His height is 5 feet 6 inches, and he is dressed in a reddish gray suit, soft black hat, smooth shaven, dark brown hair, tanned complexion, had good even, white teeth. The horses are a bay mare, 10 years old, weight 1000 lbs., and a bay gelding of about the same description.

Complaint Filed.

A complaint and an undertaking for attachment were filed today by the Albany Lumber company vs. Lillian T. Ballantyne and T. Y. S. Ballantyne. The suit is to collect the balance on a note of \$1469.50 given Sep. 24, 1913, on which 180 has been paid.

Petition to Probate.

The will provides that \$1500 be given to deceased's son and daughter, James A. Smith, of Astoria, and Lily Bergman, of Albany, and that the balance of the estate go to Wm. T. Smith, the youngest son.

Mrs. Gillard Replies.

Mrs. Nettie E. Gillard today filed a reply to defendant W. H. Gillard's answer to her complaint in a suit for divorce filed in May. Mrs. Gillard alleges that she and defendant accumulated property to the value of about \$11,000 during their married life, and asks for the original amount set forth in the complaint.

Motion for Default.

Anna O. Hill, of Dayton, Ohio, who is suing Arthur McDaniel, of Brownsville, Ore., for breach of promise, today filed a motion for default in the case.

Final Account Filed.

The final account in the estate of Clara Keefhaver, deceased, was filed today.

Line Broken in Two.

Berlin, July 6.—"The Russian line at Krasnik was broken in two," semi-official dispatches stated. "One part is being driven eastward, and the other westward toward Lublin and Ivanogorod. Warsaw is threatened by an Austro-German advance. The German 11th-Kenzen troops are in hot pursuit of the Russians south of Lublin, reports asserted. The Slavs are hurling the strongest forces against the Austro-Germans in a vain effort to push through southeastern Poland.

Six Plead Guilty.

Indianapolis, July 7.—Six men were indicted with Thomas Taggart, former chairman of the National Democratic committee, have pleaded guilty on the charge of conspiracy to corrupt county registrations in the primary election of 1914.

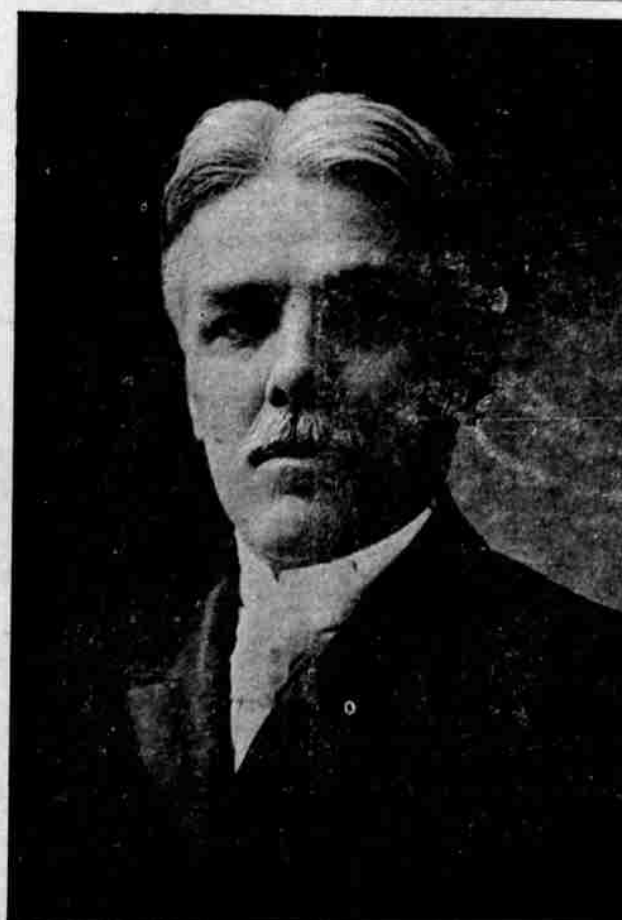
