ROSEBURG SOON TO HAVE MILL AND ROAD

Judge's Decision Places Validity on Recent Bond Election, to Build at Once.

With the decision of Judge Skippworth, of Roseburg, dismissing the case of Harry Pearce vs. City of Roseburg, a friendly suit to test the validity of the recent bond election, in which the city of Roseburg agreed to take \$300,000 of bonds in a railroad to be built by Kendall Bros., to the Forest Reserve, the way is finally cleared and actual construction work will soon begin.

Kendall Bros., a wealthy Pittsburgh firm, with immense timber holdings on the North Umpqua River, proposed to the city of Roseburg that if the city would vote the above amount of bonds and take an interest in the road, that they would build a railroad from Roseburg to the Cascade Forest, a distance of 34 miles, fully equip it and keep it open to the transportation of freight and logs to all persons, sons. They also agreed to build a saw mill at Roseburg, and plans nearly completed for the construction of a mill with 300,000 feet capacity.

The Kendalls and their families together with their mill architect and other experts, arrived at Roseburg in a special car from Pittsburgh this week, and declare that they will begin work on both the road and saw mill as soon as the contract between the city and themselves is signed.

This means a great thing for Rose-

burg and Douglas county, in which a large portion of the standing timber of the state is located.

SALEM MAN SAYS DISPLAY ARRANGEMENT FAULTY

Dr. W. B. Morse, who spent two weeks in San Francisco attending the meeting of the American Medical Association and taking in the Panama-Pacific fair, has returned to Salem. The Salem physician stated last night that the products sent to represent the state were of the very best, but that he felt that the arrangement of the same and the methods of presenting the claims of the state upon the sight-seer were not such as to give due credit to the state, and do not make the showing the products of other states in their respective buildings do because of this.

The art department of the Oregon building, under the care of Allen Eason of Eugene, came in for much praise on the part of Dr. Morse, H. A. Taylor, Geo. M. Hyland, John F. Logan, R. A. Booth, Mrs. C. N. Gray and Miss Hatch, according to the state in spite of the drawbacks mentioned.

Dr. Morse said last night that the educational side of the entire fair is highly educational and that those who like the artistic as well as the commercial side, would find that the trip pays well, even if they should not enter a building; for, claims the doctor, the architectural beauty, the beautiful blending of colors and such, are far and away ahead of anything seen at the world's fair in Chicago, or any of the other great fairs the doctor has seen.—Salem Statesman.
