ELECTRIC FAN SERVICE TO INDIGENT INVALIDS

The free electric fan service for the benefit of the indigent sick which was offered to the public last Summer by the Oregon Power company will be renewed this Summer, according to Manager White. The offer the company makes in effect is that electric fans and where necessary, the current to operate will be furnished without cost to persons seriously ill, who are unable to pay for the service. In previous years fans only were loaned, but this year a new feature will be added, namely: the addition of an electric toaster to the free invalid service. The only conditions are that the attending physician must certify to the reasonable necessity for fan service and to the patient's inability to afford it. The offer, of course, applies where the sick room is within reach of the company's lines. "The reason for making conditions of any kind is for the obvious purpose of protecting the free electric fan offer for the use of those who really need it and cannot afford it" said Manager White.

"It is a charitable proposition and not in any way allied with efforts to

obtain additional business on the part of the company. No hard and fast rules are enforced regarding the free service, our aim being to make it do as much good as possible. During the summer there are always cases where the use of an electric fan greatly improves the condition of the patient and sometimes represents the narrow margin between life and death.

This is the fourth year that this offer has been made at all the electric properties operated by H. M. Billeby & Co. It has always been received with approval and is being freely utilized by physicians. It has attracted attention all over the country and many editorials were printed endorsing the act and expressing gratitude that public utility corporations desired to express charitable efforts in this practical and personal way. Unquestionably much good was accomplished and other public utility companies inaugurated similar service. This year probably many other central station companies will do likewise.

"It has been asserted that this free fan service is offered to obtain favorable advertising for the company. In reply to this, I would say merely that the service cannot be rendered at all without a certain degree of publicity, inasmuch as the public must know of the offer in order to take advantage of it."

Obituary.

Solomon Grimes was born Dec. 19, 1838, in Des Moines county, Iowa. He married Mary E. Hilderbrand, February 13, 1861, and to them were born 11 children, seven sons and four daughters, all of whom are living. He also has 47 grand children; all living but one, and 6 great grand children, all living.

Mr. Grimes with his family, moved to California in the Spring of 1870 and to Oregon in 1871, settling in Jackson county. He resided also in Jackson and Josephine counties until 1881 when he moved to Linn county, settling near here, and has been a resident of this vicinity since.

He united with the Baptist church about 32 years ago under the labors of Rev. John Osborn. While on a visit to his eldest daughter at Marlin, Ore., he died July 7, 1915 at the age of 76 years. Besides his immediate family, of whom there are 63, he leaves 3

brothers and two sisters. Funeral July 9, at Shelburn, Rev. G. H. Young officiating.
