LIBERTY BELL.

The coming of the Liberty Bell to this city is an event that will be appreciated. People generally want to see the wonderful relic, not as a curiosity, but because of what it means to the country. Seeing the bell is far more than a mere sight of a famous piece of copper. It is operating everywhere as a loyalty enhancer, knitting the people of the country closer together.

The bell itself is just a common affair, evidently not being very well made, else it would not have cracked. The ingredients were no doubt incorrectly mixed. It is 12 feet in circumference at the lip, 7 feet 6 inches at the crown. Its thickness is 1 1/4 inches to 3 inches. The clapper is 3 feet 2 inches long. The bell was modeled after one cast by order of Henry III in memory of Edward the Confessor, of the thirteenth century. The frame of the bell is walnut, never moved since the bell was placed in position in 1758.

The bell is said to have been rung on July 8, 1776, instead of July 4 to commemorate the Declaration of Independence. At the same time the bells of Christ church also rang. The bell rang annually thereafter until 1835, also on the surrender of Cornwallis, as a welcome to Washington and Lafayette, and in mourning for Franklin, Adams, Jefferson and Lafayette.

EFFECT OF WAR.

So far they are loyal to traditions, to dynasties, to militarism. When the blast of war is over, what will be the verdict? Will it not be that dynamic and military governments have failed to protect the people. Will the workingman and the peasant fail to see that whatever nation wins, they lose? Will they fail to assert, more forcefully than ever before, that henceforth the alternative of war rather than peace must rest with the common people? This seems the reasonable safe prophecy. Absolutism is being weighed in the balance and is found wanting. There remains only democracy as the hope of the common people.
