MAKES STRONG BID FOR SHRINERS' CONVENTION

Seattle, Wash., July 14.—The selection of the new member of the imperial divan of the Shrine order and the city which will entertain the forty-second council meeting in 1916, held the attention of the Shrine council today at the second session of the annual meeting being held here. The new member of the Divan, captain of the outer guard, will become imperial potentate in 11 years, if nothing intervenes, and the prize is the most eagerly sought in Shrinedom.

St. Louis made a strong bid for the 1916 council, already having raised a fund of \$50,000 for entertainment purposes. The Missouri city Shriners brought a huge balloon with them. It will be released tomorrow at Woodland Park, during an immense barbecue spread for the bands and patrols of the visiting temples.

Live Stock Market.

Portland, July 12.—The first of the week run of cattle began with a registration of 1000 head; Monday's market starting off briskly at about steady prices on steers, a car-load of choice ones going at \$6.75; she stuff showed a weakness and closed at 10 to 15 cents off.

Hogs do not show any improvement in regard to the character of offerings; out of the 2700 received none were in prime shape. Market considered steady to a shade lower, tops bringing \$7.40.

Choice lambs no doubt would bring \$6.50, ewes and wethers in proportion; 1700 changed hands Monday morning at an even price with last week.

SHRINERS TO PASS ALBANY BEGINNING THURSDAY NIGHT

Forty-nine Trains of Delegates on Way From Seattle to San Francisco.

After Albany has duly saluted the Liberty Bell tomorrow and sent it on its way south to be viewed by other thousands of patriotic Americans, this city will be silently invaded by 49 train loads of other visitors. They are the delegates that have been attending the national convention of the Mystic Shrine in Seattle and are on their way to San Francisco to take possession of the big exposition for a short time.

Beginning late Thursday night the first of the procession will pass through the city and continue until about 11:30 next Monday night. There are 49 special passenger trains of Shriners and families from all parts of the country.

The mobilization of the immense delegation furnishes a problem to every line over which it passes. It is an increase of about 500 per cent over the ordinary volume of business and requires the addition of a large force of trainmen and other employees in the service, to say nothing of the additional equipment. The Southern Pacific Co. has already detailed a force of men to patrol the tracks and extra flagmen to keep the trains at the proper distance apart. No trains will run closer than 20 minutes apart in places where there are no block signals. The engines which will haul the loads are now being concentrated at Portland and the crew assignments made in a thoroughly scientific manner. To handle this large amount of traffic requires a high degree of efficiency in the railroad organization, and all roads over which the Shriners' special have passed have been given a thorough test in handling the business without delay and with safety.

Army men are said to be interested in the ability of the railroads to care for the touring thousands, so that they can base their estimates on how rapidly troops could be concentrated at a given point on the Pacific coast should such ever become necessary. As the movement of the Shriners' trains is all southward, the crews will be brought back north in sleeping cars, so that when they arrive in Portland they will be rested and ready for work without delay.
