## WHY SUCH ENTHUSIASM?

Why do people flock by thousands to railroad centers to see the liberty bell of the U. S.? Not because there is anything in the bell itself people care to see; but because it represents the very essence of loyalty to our government. It was the first to ring out for liberty; now it is being shown for liberty. People want to see it because of its history and what it means to the country. At this time particularly the people of the country are getting very close together, a sentiment of loyalty prevailing that is intense. It is certainly to be hoped that our country keeps out of the disgraceful war that is making Europe a slaughter house; but if it ever should be involved there would be no question as to the unanimity of support our government would have in the part it would take in the contest. Albany welcomes the bell here.

## INTERNATIONAL RULES.

A noted writer has worked out the following for the government of great international questions, offering some splendid suggestions, that read well on paper, and are as far as man can go in the face of the passions of war:

"I. All men are kindred. Therefore nations must be humane. The Geneva convention establishing the Red Cross society to ameliorate the conditions of the wounded in battle is an international expression of humanitarianism.

"II. All men are social. As Kant suggested, there are not infinite spaces on this globe. We must suffer each other willy-nilly. Inevitable human sociability demands that intercommunication be universal, reliable, inexpensive. We are reminded at once of the universal postal union. The nations of the world have concerted to carry out letters to almost every nook and cranny of the globe.

"III. Commerce. Each part of the world needs all other parts. The unimpeded exchange of the world's goods promotes prosperity.

"IV. Mankind advances most rapidly by cooperation.

"V. World movements must be regulated by world intelligence; therefore the will of the people everywhere must be supreme.

"VI. Every part of mankind is entitled to freedom. International suppression of slavery.

"VII. The illness of one portion of humanity is the peril of all.

"VIII. Mankind is intellectual and moral; not material and brutal; therefore differences between nations must be settled by reason and right, and not by force.
