REVIEW OF INDUSTRIAL DOINGS OF OREGON

On July 13 the first full wagon load of hogs ever seen in Hood River appeared on the street.

The supreme court has handed down a decision absolving the O. W. R. & N. Co. from liability to trespassers.

Portland iron manufacturers soon may be engaged in the task of making shrapnel for the European armies.

University of Oregon report shows imports of Chinese eggs have reached noticeable proportions.

The latest thing to be regulated in Portland is the poster for the moving picture shows.

Paisley National Bank increases capital \$40,000.

Sound of the ground to be occupied by the proposed Federal Building at Roseburg, have been started.

Kendall Bros. will start work on their 30 mile timber railroad out of Roseburg soon.

Penitentiary will have a \$25,000 Carnegie library.

One hundred forty men are busy laying track on the Willamette Pacific from the bridge north on Coos Bay.

P. A. Frakes will dedicate a large and expensive dairy barn on Coos Bay island with a horrowarming, dance and luncheon attended by 600 guests.

\$3000 will be spent surveying Yaquina bar with view of obtaining 25-foot channel.

Work on Warrenton's new \$12,000 gravity water system has commenced.

Marion county is laying about 20,000 yards of hard surface pavement.

A great revival in the fruit canning and fruit preserving industry, so far as the practice in the home is concerned, has followed the O. W. R. & N. company's series of demonstrations now being conducted in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

Portland—1800 tons of Colorado marble will be used on the new First National bank to cost \$400,000.

Roseburg—Circuit court sustains legality of 300,000 railroad bond issue.

At the international Press Congress in San Francisco, Edgar B. Piper of the Oregonian, Portland, took exception to the increasing federal control of publications.

"I do not proclaim the right of a newspaper to print what it pleases, when it pleases and where it pleases, but I repudiate the implied assumption and exercise, by government, of the function of newspaper administration in detail.

Blumauer-Frank Drug Co. of Portland has started a move to establish drug farms for raising different drug plants.

The citizens of Roseburg at a mass meeting adopted resolutions opposing any move that may be made in the directions of placing the Oregon and California railroad lands in a national or state reserve, as such a move would tie the lands up an indefinite number of years and deprive the county of thousands of dollars of taxes.

SNOWBALL FIGHT ON TOP OF MOUNT RAINIER

Seattle, Wash., July 16.—Led by the delegates to the Imperial council meeting which yesterday closed its forty-first annual session in this city, several thousand Shriners today

snowballed each other on the slopes of Mount Rainier; crawled over glaciers; explored ice caves, discovered new wild flowers and even scaled the summit of the great peak.

Loaded with red fez wearers, special trains left Seattle shortly after sunrise and arrived at the Rainier National park during the morning. After luncheon at the inn they went out on the side of the mountain under the care of trained guides, visiting Paradise Valley and several of the noted glaciers.

Tonight the Easterners will sleep on the mountains and tomorrow afternoon will return to Seattle. While a portion of the delegates and Shrine members were making the junket to Mount Rainier, several thousand more boarded an oceangoing steamer and cruiser for the entire day on Puget Sound, going west to the foot of the Olympic mountains and the strait of Juan de Fuca, and north as far as the Canadian boundary.

Several bands accompanied the travelers and played at Everett, Anacortes, Bellingham, and other cities visited.

TO DEDICATE STATUE OF ROBERT E. LEE

Baltimore, Md., July 16.—The statue of Robert Lee mounted on his famous charger "Traveler" will be dedicated here sometime during the latter part of October, the state battlefield commission announced today.

The statue is a memorial by the state of Virginia and will be situated on West Confederate avenue. In front of the memorial will be a group representing the walks of life from which Lee's army was recruited. The group measured 16 feet in length and the figures are seven feet high. Lee will look directly over the group and all will face the "Bloody Angle."
