THE TALE OF THE POOR SEAMSTRESS (REVISED)

By Establishing New Ways and Easier Methods of Obtaining the same Results, Electricity has Done Much to Revise the Viewpoint of the World on Hitherto Laborious Occupations.

Authors, who used to play their pathetic-widow characters in the role of wan, wasted seamstresses forever plying the needle until "their fingers were literally worn to the bone," are beginning to seek other subjects. For electricity has stepped in to do the hard, tedious, nerve-wearying work of sewing, and is doing it at a cost so low that even the humblest income can afford to enjoy its efficient aid. Electricity has taken the tragic side



of sewing and transformed it into joy.

Today the electric sewing machine motor, attached readily to any sewing machine, takes care of the strenuous, strength-exacting effort that pedalling a sewing machine used to involve. Electric sewing machine motors are enabling professional dressmakers, tailors and seamstresses to turn out a bigger volume of work, to turn it out better and quicker, and at a far less expense than ever before.

Many a woman who would like to do her own sewing, but who formerly was unwilling or unable physically to undertake the trying task of pedalling a sewing machine, now may sew to her heart's content with needier a thought of fatigue or nerve exhaustion. For efficient electric sewing machine motors may be purchased at a very moderate figure and the amount of electric current they use is really insignificant.

Electricity, the modern wonder-worker, thus has administered a striking rebuke to another of the squalid,



pitiful themes of the ages. For not only does the modern seamstress use an electric sewing machine motor—but, when occasion requires an artificial illuminant, she switches on the safe, clear, clean, healthful, congenial, to-the-eyes electric light, although in most cases the convenience of electric light outlets throughout a home permit one to move the sewing machine operated by an electric sewing motor close enough to a window to get full benefit of the daylight, for the motor is readily connected to any convenient socket.

There are several models of sewing machine motors which also may be used as light utility motors about the home, particularly for kitchen work when not needed for operating the sewing machine. This convenience is possible, of course, because the motors that are adapted to this general utility work are really utility motors in every sense of the word, and are so constructed. For polishing silverware, operating ice cream freezers and doing scores of household chores these utility motors are unsurpassed.

Every visitor to the Oregon building will be served a generous glass of this delicious juice that bids fair to outstrip grape juice and even knock champagne off its old time pedestal. They will be served from the Willamette valley booth, where Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Taylor of Marion county, F. W. Warren of Lane, Dr. Dunsmore of Polk and H. O. Freytag of Clackamas will do the honors; and in the reception room, where Mrs. Charles A. Gray, Oregon's gracious hostess, will preside, and in the main body of the Oregon building where a group of Oregon girls will daintily fill the brimming glasses. The Salem Brewing company has been metamorphosed into the Oregon Fruit Juice company, and they are squeezing the handsome little red berries, we understand, to the tune of 1,000 gallons a day; the juice is being bottled and the market is growing. Loganberry day at the exposition will give it such a boost that the little red berries will have to hurry to keep up.

In addition to drinking loganberry juice all day long in the Oregon building, the imbibers will have an opportunity to toast the man that made loganberries; at least, he made them possible in Oregon, he introduced the first ones from California, buying a few plants from Mr. Logan, who produced the Loganberry by crossing the raspberry and the blackberry, and this man is Senator LaFollette, who will be the speaker of the day.
