ALBANY MAN TELLS ABOUT THE BIG FAIR

Liberty Bell Draw the Biggest Crowd of the Exposition; Oregon Display Draws.

San Francisco, July 17.—It is estimated that 200,000 people were upon the exposition grounds today when the Liberty Bell was formally received and placed upon exhibition for the remaining period of the Exposition.

A parade of the military and naval forces of the U. S. stationed here and National Guard of California, as an escort to the venerable relic made an impressive spectacle.

Hon. Champ Clark of Missouri delivered the address of the day to an immense crowd of listeners. After the ceremonies connected with the reception was concluded, the bell was placed in the Pennsylvania building where it will rest during its stay.

Mrs. Henrietta Brown, Mrs. Stevenson and daughter were among the Albany visitors and were much pleased with the exhibition.

The car and management on the part of the exposition is very satisfactory.

The grounds are extremely well managed and a lady or child may wander at will with perfect safety.

Art Smith, the aviator, continues to give thrills to the crowds by his daring feats in the air yesterday turning eleven complete somersaults in the air and three side spirals.

The tower of jewels is certainly a thing of beauty, its thousands of glittering jewels reflecting the radiance of the sun by day, and the many search lights by night.

Monday is Shriners' day and already many members of the order are gathering at this oasis.

Troops A First cavalry, of Portland came up yesterday on its return from instruction camp at Monterey and will spend three days visiting the exposition. Among its members we noticed Lieut. Coplan, formerly of Lebanon, and Sergeant Orville Looney, formerly of Albany.

The amusements on the zone are generally of the class previously shown at other expositions, and with the exception of the Panama Canal presents no new features.

A visit to the Panama-Pacific exposition would be incomplete without viewing the reproduction of the great isthmian waterway, the completion of which is now being celebrated by the world at large through the medium of the present fair. The Panama Canal on the zone is the talk of the entire country. It is deemed the wonder of the exposition. Everybody is delighted with it and government and world's fair officials have placed their stamp of approval upon it.

At an expenditure of over half a million dollars the original canal and the surrounding zone territory have been reproduced in miniature form so accurately one can almost imagine that he is taking an aeroplane trip over the isthmus of Panama. A bird's-eye view of the entire country is obtained as the moving platform slowly conveys one over the five acre tract of land upon which has been constructed this clever piece of engineering work.

The topography of the canal zone is laid out in accordance with the character of the soil and as the panorama painted by the scenic artist blends harmoniously with the other work, one obtains a view of 5,000 square miles of territory in making the half hour journey.

In perfect comfort one can watch the entrance of a ship at the Pacific side and see it glide apparently under its own power through the Miraflores and Pedro Miguel locks, between the great mountains of dirt at Culebra Cut, through Gatun Lake and locks and out into the Atlantic ocean by way of Colon Harbor and Limon Bay. During this entire trip each point of interest is described by means of a telephonic-phonographic inven-
