OTHER STATES ADOPTING OREGON SCHOOL STANDARDS

Exhibit at Fair Attracts Notice
From All Over the
Country.

Several counties in California have decided to adopt the Oregon plan of standardizing rural schools. As a result of the Oregon educational exhibit at the fair the Napa county farm bureau has decided to adopt the Oregon system for their county, after making an inspection of the system in this state. Four other California counties have decided to adopt the plan, and the state superintendent's office is constantly in receipt of letters from all over the country.

The following from the Salem Journal tells of the wide notoriety gained by the Oregon system:

"The department of education is daily receiving letters from all parts of the United States asking for information as to the standardization method used in Oregon. Among those who have requested further information are: Miss Mary Zachery, Atlanta, Ga.; Mrs. N. L. Bagley, Birmingham, Ala.; Miss Mary Mims, Minden, La.; R. B. Hummel, Ben Lomond, Cal.; and Superintendent Boettcher, Warren, Ohio. In addition to information about the standard school plan, very many letters are coming asking for Superintendent Churchill's Play Ground Manual which is recognized as the best form on this subject published in the United States. In order to meet the inquiries Superintendent Churchill has published a special bulletin explaining the standard school plan, and is now preparing another bulletin giving full information how to organize and carry on work of the boys' and girls' industrial clubs."

Drove an Ox Team—

Noah's Ark and Other Vessels.

It is generally agreed that Noah's ark measured about 450 feet in length, 75 feet in breadth and 45 feet in depth.

The Greeks and the Romans constructed several large vessels measuring upward of 500 feet. These were built for the emperors or rulers, and were little more than enormous scows, without any means of propulsion.

A vessel 420 feet in length was built by Ptolemy, which was propelled by 500 rowers, arranged in five banks, using oars fifty-seven feet in length.

The fame of the Thalamagus still lives. This boat, which measured 300 feet in length, 40 feet in breadth and 60 feet in depth, was said to have been the most beautiful craft in antiquity, and was used exclusively by the emperor.

A king of Syracuse is also credited with having built a very palatial boat, whose cabins were hung with costly silks and decorated with rare statues. After the decline of the Roman empire no great ships were constructed for more than 1,000 years.—Pearson's
