ALBANY EXPERT TELLS HOW TO GROW WALNUTS

As I have many inquiries in regard to the growing of English Walnuts in the Willamette valley and believe that I can reach many of the inquirers through the Democrat, will try and

give my opinion, based on some ten years' experience in practice as a practical grower of walnuts. The essential qualities are grouped into production and period of ripening. The ideal nut for the Willamette valley is the Vrooman, Franquet, as first choice and Mayette with every sixth tree a Maylan as a pollinizer, second choice. The trees must be grafted from good healthy producing trees on

black walnut roots, in no case planting the so-called second generation tree, as they are worthless seedlings and not worth standing room in the orchard. I must say that the fact that grafted trees cost so much more than the second generation trees and many planters think they are saving money by planting the second generation trees, this is a mistake, the second generation tree is grown from a nut from a grafted tree, and as the walnut is a free lover and will pollinize from a walnut tree of any kind, the black walnut not excepted, which makes the seedling very uncertain and just the same as cherry or apple seedlings, not worth planting, so do not allow some nursery sales agent to persuade you to take the second generation trees at any price.

It is very difficult to graft nursery stock, the per cent of living grafts some times not being more than fifteen to the hundred, seedlings grow very easy.

Now looking for a location for a walnut grove, most all of the land of the Willamette valley will grow walnuts but some soils are better than others, the first thing to look at is the air drainage, see that you have a good circulation of air and no sagging down or air pockets, this will prevent trouble from frost in blooming time as the constant moving of the air prevents humidity from setting; if the humidity settles and the thermometer registers 30 to 35 degrees above 0 there is danger of damage to the nut crop, but if the air has a good circulation the danger is small. Next is the soil which should be deep, free from hardpan and either gravel or clay sub-soil, the foot hills is as good a location as the valleys, the walnut will grow and thrive on either with proper care, and third is water drainage, do not allow water to stand on the ground, keep it drained off as it will injure the trees.

Cultivation must be carefully and thoroughly done, constantly stirring the soil in dry weather to preserve the moisture and do not allow three to begin bearing until five or six years old as too early bearing will stunt the growth of the trees. Pruning: Head the trees from six to six and one half feet from the ground as the limbs are inclined to droop, thin the limbs out so that the tree will have a well shaped head and be well balanced, prune every year until this is accomplished and then do not neglect pruning when it is needed. We have some very nice young wal-

nut groves in this county, that will be in bearing this coming year. Miss Helen V. Crawford of Lebanon has a very fine young walnut grove which is six years old and will bear this year. She has peaches as fillers, which is a good thing. The peaches are to be removed when the space is needed for the walnuts. The Jenks Bros. of Tangent, have 125 acres of a younger planting. Mr. Stump of Monmouth, Polk county, has a walnut grove ten years old which has been in bearing for several years. I was told that his nine year old trees made him one year (that is 1913), \$8 to the tree. He has 27 trees to the acre, or 40 feet apart each way, the standard spacing is 40

to 50 feet apart; that is 17 to 27 trees per acre. Good returns are to be had from a walnut grove in this valley, and the investment is all right if properly managed.

Hot Weather and Milk.

Washington, July 21.—This summer had proved to the usual number of housewives the complexity of the problem of caring for milk in hot weather.

Heat to the extent accumulated by allowing milk to stand on a warm porch or in the sun is enough to start the bacteria in milk to multiplying at a rapid rate and thus make it unfit for use as sweet milk, according to the dairy specialists of the department of agriculture. The hot days also bring the flies, the great germ carriers, and the clouds of dust laden with bacteria, which, when coming to rest on milk receptacles may easily contaminate the milk.

Milk is regarded as a neutral medium for bacteria, and the rapidity with which the various forms will multiply under the proper temperatures is astonishing. It has been shown that if a cubic centimeter (about one-half teaspoonful) of milk containing 10 bacteria is kept at 68 per cent cent temperature for 24 hours the bacteria will have multiplied into about 61,000. In the same milk, if held at 50 per cent the growth of bacteria would be very small, possibly as low as 40 in 24 hours.
