REPORTING FROM MEMORY.

When Note Taking Was Forbidden in
the House of Commons.

Holcroft's feat in memorizing the
whole play of "Figaro" after hearing
it ten times could probably have been
easily outdone by "Memory" Woodfall,
who in the days when note taking was
forbidden in the house of commons
acquired fame by the extraordinary
power of reporting from memory the
speeches he heard in that august as-
sembly.

His usual attitude during a debate,
says the London Chronicle, was to close
his eyes and lean forward with both
hands upon his stick, being so well ac-
quainted with the tone and manner of
the several speakers that he seldom
changed his attitude save to catch the
name of a new member.

The speeches thus memorized he
printed in his journal, and so wonder-
ful was his memory that he could re-
tain full recollection of a debate a fort-
night after, though having listened to
many long nights of speaking in the
interval. He used to say he could put
any speech away on a corner shelf of
his mind for future reference.
