SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

This week Warsaw has been in the eyes of the world, again coming to the front, after many years of quiet. Once it was noted in war circles. It is again before the world. The Germans have been gradually getting closer and closer, pushing forward with an indomitable will that has characterized their course since the beginning of the war, and Warsaw is fated to go the ways of several other cities, her magnificent buildings and beautiful works of art shattered by shell and bullet. This is war in these days of reputed civilization.

The United States has sent her new note to Germany, insisting, it is said, on neutrals being respected. The demand is simply that Americans traveling shall be insured safety, at least are entitled to a fair warning. It probably means that the two countries will continue their negotiations, with interchange of communications for some time, and, it is to be hoped, without a break of the past relationship between the two countries.

In this country we have been having some peculiar experiences with a smell in them of the war across the ocean. Factories making munitions for shipment to Europe have been the targets of dynamiters and strikers, causing some concern in the factories, with calls for the militia. These things are creating little problems that grow as they are studied, a part of a network of things coming up as an outgrowth of the world's worst war.

News was received this week that Albany is to have the presence of a man here who is decidedly in the line of the world, Mr. W. J. Bryan, recently secretary of state, who resigned because he did not agree with the war policy of the president and his cabinet. He declared his mission to be peace, through other channels than the government. He will no doubt speak here on the subject so close to his present purposes, which will mean an enormous audience to hear him. Albany people know that it is a privilege to hear him simply as an orator; but many will have other things in view.

The more we work harmoniously with our neighbors along all lines the better the results for the community. The people of a community should stand together along all lines but go to build up the best interests of all. This is true in a business way as well as morally. In this regard it is a big thing when people make a practice of doing their trading at home, among their neighbors and fellow citizens, instead of sending away under the allurements of big catalogues and flaming promises, leaping in the dark.
