ROSEBURG OBSTRUCTIONISTS WOULD BLOCK BENDING

On June 3, the city of Roseburg, by an overwhelming majority of 8 to 1, voted to subscribe to \$300,000 worth of bonds in a railroad to be built from that city to the national forest reserve 34 miles away by Kendall Bros., of Pittsburgh, Pa., the latter to put up about \$750,000 in the railroad and build a saw mill costing about \$300,000. After the bonds were carried and their legality passed on by the circuit court and referred to the supreme court at Salem for final examination, a small handful of obstructionists at Roseburg are endeavoring to have the election and will of the people set aside. They have engaged Ralph Dunaway, of Portland, who tried to hold up the building of the Broadway bridge a few years ago, to handle their case, and Wednesday they filed their complaint to enjoin the city from bonding.

It is hardly thought that their protest will carry, for the legal papers were carefully prepared all the way through, and Kendall Bros. have a reputation for doing things right. Roseburg is to be congratulated for their new railroad, on which construction is to start about August 10.

BIG SHOWING MADE FOR COMPENSATION LAW

The state Industrial Accident Commission makes the following report for the compensation law:

During the year employers paid into the fund \$450,932.49 and workmen contributed \$78,754.33. The state, in addition to the original appropriation of \$50,000, paid in \$40,354.22, making the total receipts \$569,032.04.

There has been set aside to guarantee pensions \$174,834.99, and workmen received \$121,638.27 as compensation for time loss. The cost of surgical service, medicines, transportation to hospitals and hospital accommodations has been \$66,657.93, and \$7,060.27 was paid in pensions. The administrative cost for the entire 20 months, which includes eight months of preliminary organization and including fixtures and equipment, was \$20,129.22. The total disbursements have been \$440,329.68, leaving a surplus in the fund of \$128,702.36. In addition, contributions for June pay rolls, approximating \$60,000, as due the fund, and the amount to be paid by the state, although not due until the end of the year, is \$35,168.70.

Who Pays the Taxes?

Agriculture pays on one-fourth the taxable property, lumber on about one-fifth, city and town property on about two-fifths, and railroads and public utility companies on about one-eighth in the state of Oregon.

Found Fire Blight

County Fruit Inspector D. W. Rumbaugh was in Lebanon and vicinity yesterday. We are sorry to learn that he found a few cases of the dreaded disease, fire blight, in orchards of this section. He says there is only one sure way to get rid of the disease, and that is to cut and burn every tree that shows infection. —Lebanon E. A.

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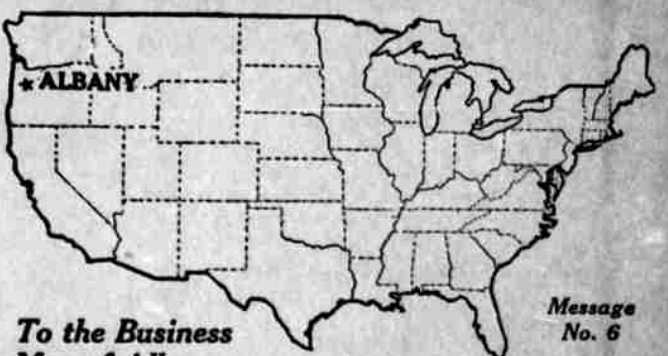
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
