LAST NOTE WORDED WELL.

The president's last note to Germany, while not strictly an ultimatum, is a firm statement of the position of the United States, and is so worded as to make it plain enough to Germany that if that country shall retain the present friendly relationship that practice of blowing up steamers with Americans on board must cease. In short Germany must respect the rights of neutrals. The president has been very wise in his wording of the note. The occasion is not one calling for a definite ultimatum; yet it is one that should show Germany that the rights of Americans as neutrals to travel on the open seas of the world, is inviolate. It may be true that Americans were very foolish in travelling on the Lusitania, after being warned, and yet, the boat was entitled to a warning and the passengers given time to disembark. Germany will no doubt see and appreciate the big point in the note, and should modify her position so as to meet the demands of this country for just treatment of neutrals.

ENCOURAGE ENTERPRISE.

In an address as president of the American Iron and Steel Institute, Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the United States Steel corporation, said some interesting things about business conditions—things especially interesting because steel conditions are taken as an index of the general business situation, and during the European war much American steel has been shipped abroad. He gave as one reason for lack of prosperity this: "The opinion is ventured that lack of continuous business prosperity and success in this country for a number of years has, in part been the direct result of undue ill-considered or unjustifiable assaults which have been made by governmental agencies or by the erroneous and unwise policies of different branches or departments of government."

Judge went on to say the government should encourage business enterprise and that there is room for improvement in governmental business methods.

Certainly the steel trust has been duly encouraged, built up into a colossal concern, through favorable national legislation.

ON EVE OF PROSPERITY.

The trouble is probably due to waste, money spent poorly.

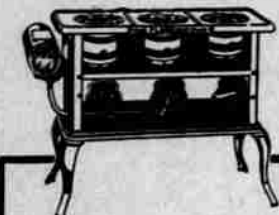
