MR. BRYAN TOMORROW.

Tomorrow the people of this part of the United States will have the privilege of hearing one of the world's most prominent men, of world wide fame. No American has been more prominently before the people during the past 15 or 20 years than W. J. Bryan. Three times a candidate for president and the premier of this great republic he is in a position to command the attention of people universally. They want to hear him as the great peace advocate. Many people believe the same as Mr. Bryan does in this matter of peace negotiation. The criticism of him has not been in reference to his ideas on the subject; but more upon his leaving the cabinet at the critical time involved.
