## ALBANY MAN SEES THINGS AT FAIR

Heard Both Bryan and Roosevelt, Met Numerous Albany People and Boosts Fair.

San Francisco, Cal., July 26.—The exposition has its crowds daily. Roosevelt day drew many people to whom T. R. delivered an impressive address on Peace and War. It is especially interesting to see the hold that both he and ex-Secretary Bryan have upon what might be termed the masses. While in many ways possessed of widely divergent views each undoubtedly believes in the theories he exploits and has the courage of his convictions to be willing to state them. The exercises of Illinois day were brought to an abrupt close by the news of the awful disaster in Chicago, great preparations had been made for a showing by the officials and representatives from that state. The governor of Illinois, the mayor of Chicago and a regiment of the national guard numbering 1000 were here but their proposed celebration was turned into a day of mourning for the great loss of life occasioned by the sinking of the steamer Eastland.

There can be no doubt that great good has been accomplished by the showing made by our state and the Willamette valley association in the various displays of our products. The agricultural display attracts many visitors, some showing strong inclinations toward investment and future residence in the Willamette valley.
