completed and was also adopted, and M. T. McAlister was allowed his claim of \$111.50 for doing that work.

Herbert Babb, who was employed by the committee of fire and water to inspect and report on the conditions of the buildings at 440 West First street belonging to A. C. Woodcock, of Corvallis, and the frame at 122 S. Ferry at the rear of the St. Francis hotel, made his reports last night. In his opinion the building at First and Washington streets is in a bad condition, a menace to the lives of pedestrians, and railings should be placed around it until it can be torn down. It is understood that plans are being made to replace this building with a substantial structure. This report was ordered placed on file. The building at 122 Ferry street was also reported to have been found in very bad condition and a menace to human lives and the surrounding property and it was recommended that it be torn down. City Attorney Dan Johnston was instructed to take the necessary steps to have the building dismantled.

A communication was received from E. S. Geer, of 1406 E. 7th, complaining that sewer connections had not been made at the property at 8th and Pine streets where there is an open lavatory.

Four petitions were received from property owners on the alleys between 10th and 12th streets near the new Cottage street trunk sewer, asking for a lateral sewer through the alley. The petitions were referred to the committee on health and police in connection with the city engineer.

Another paving petition was granted last evening that will mean the construction of four more blocks of hard

surface this summer. Property owners representing 1455 of the 2386 feet of frontage on Washington street between 9th and 13th, signed up for the work. Plans and specifications will be completed as soon as possible and the contract awarded to the lowest bidder.

A resolution was passed calling for plans and specifications for the improvement of First street between Main and Sherman.

Two ordinances declaring a surplus on the lateral sewer in block 8, Hackleman's Third addition, and in blocks 11 and 12, Bryant's addition, completed the work of the evening.

FIRST ELECTRIC AUTOMOBILE CAME UP FROM PORTLAND

Will Spaulding, Northwest agent for the Millburn Electric automobiles, arrived in Albany last evening from Portland, coming up in an electric car, said to be the longest trip made in the Northwest by an electric car. He came from Salem in two hours and 20 minutes, good travelling for one of these cars. The beauty of them is not their speed, for they are now slow; but their ease and simplicity of control. There is not a jar and they start off without a rattle or sound. A Democrat man who took his first ride in the auto admits he was delighted with the experience. The car goes fifty-five or sixty miles on each charge of electricity. This will undoubtedly be greatly increased.
