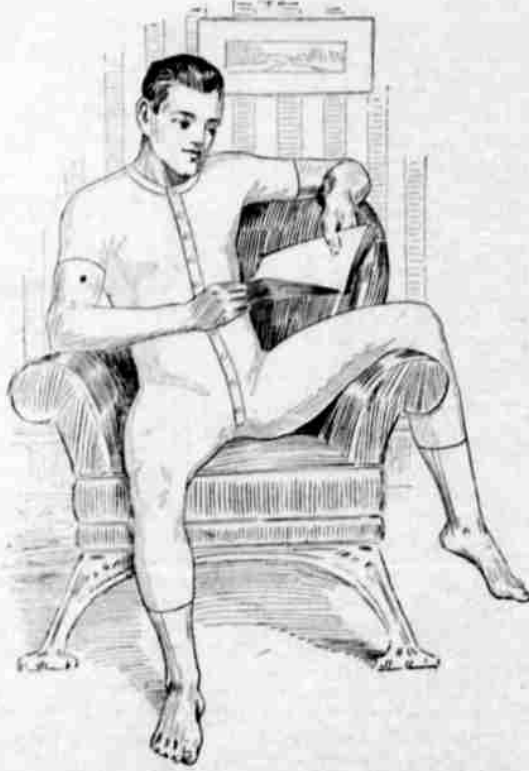

Another Submarine Victim.

Washington, July 31.—Another American has fallen a victim of the German submarine attacks. Mole tender Wiley, of the steamer Iberian, sunk off the Irish coast, died of the shock from wounds received when the vessel was shelled. Consul Frost of Queenstown reported the sinking of the Iberian, and Wiley's death to the state department. The time of the attack of the Iberian is not mentioned. It is believed it was late Friday or early today. One message said the Iberian was not shelled until it disregarded the signals to halt. The crew were given time to take to the boats.

Five of the crew were killed outright, and two, including one American, died of wounds after being placed in small boats.

INSPIRATION OF THE COUNTY FAIR

When you enter the agricultural department of the county fair, you feel your soul uplifted and your life takes on a new power—that is the inspiration of the soil. You are overpowered by the grandeur and magnificence of the scene—that is the spirit of the harvest. You can hear the voice of nature calling you back to the soil—that is opportunity knocking at your door. It is a good chance to spend a quiet hour in contact with the purity and perfection of nature and to sweeten your life with its fragrance, elevate your ideals with its beauty and expand your imagination with its power.

These products as food are fit for the gods, and as an article of commerce they ought to bring top prices on any market in the world.

The products of the soil are teachers and preachers as well. Their beauty gives human life its first entertainment, their perfection stirs the genius in artists; their purity furnishes models for growth of character and their marvelous achievements excite our curiosity and we inquire into the wonderful process of nature.

Before leaving the parlor of agriculture where nature is leading in her most graceful attire and science is climbing the giddy heights of perfection, let us pause and take a retrospective view. How many of you know that after these wonderful products are raised, they can seldom be marketed at a profit? Take the blushing Elberta, for example—they were fed to the hogs by the railroad last year. The onion—the nation's favorite vegetable—every year rots by the acre in the Southwest for want of a market and as a result hundreds of farmers have lost their homes. Cotton—nature's capitalist—often goes begging on the market at less than cost of production.

It is great to wander through the exhibits while the band is playing "Dixie" and boast of the marvelous fertility of the soil and pride ourselves on our ability to master science, but it is also well to remember that there is a market side to agriculture that does not reflect its hardships in the exhibits at a county fair.

On "Back to the Soil With Wall Street"



When Wall Street wants good business men, she usually goes back to the soil to get them. That financial thoroughfare is said to be honey-combed with men who have plowed barefooted, who have drunk branch water, eaten corn-bread and molasses and slept on the floor in their early days. A man is more capable of holding the reins of business who knows how to drive a team of mules, shear a sheep or put a ring in a goat's nose. A man is better equipped to meet the problems of life who in his youth has walked the log across the creek to get to school, courted the girls at husking bees and pitched horse shoes Saturday afternoon. A man who has spent the moonlight nights of his youth possum hunting, going to protracted meetings and occasionally turning down the community at a spelling match has the right sort of stuff in him to make a good business man. The active officials of most of the large business organizations of America, it is said, were, with a very few exceptions, raised on the farm, and could swim the creek, pitch hay, chop wood, milk the cows or slop the hogs as easily as they can run world-wide business institutions.

The farmers look to these capable and loyal sons of the soil to assist in the solution of the business problems of agriculture. Wall Street is reputed to be capable of financing everything from a Y. M. C. A. to a war, why not finance agriculture? It is not sufficient to lend money to a correspondent to lend to a local banker, to lend to a broker to lend to a merchant, to lend to the landlord to lend to a farmer. Such a financial system sounds like the house that Jack built, and is just about as useful. Neither is assistance complete when money is furnished buyers to "move the crop." What the farmer wants is money to hold the crop. What better security is there than a warehouse receipt for a bale of cotton, a sack of wheat or a bushel of corn, and why will such securities not travel by the side of government bonds?

The American farmer is a capable plowman. He always has filled and always will fill the nation's granary, larder and wardrobe, but he has nothing to say in fixing the price of his products. The problem confronting the farmers of this nation today is marketing and its solution depends first upon the farmer organizing for concert of action and the co-operation of the financial interests in marketing the crop. Agriculture is the biggest business in America and the only one that has not a financial system adapted to its use.

OREGON EXHIBIT STILL ATTRACTS MANY VISITORS

Art Smith, Aviator, Had Narrow

Motor Stopped.

San Francisco, July 30.—Among the exposition visitors the past few days were Miss Vera Taylor, Miss Winslow Hutchinson, Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Essex, Dr. and Mrs. D. H. Leach, and Mrs. Lloyd Marquam. Among the callers at the Oregon booth today were Mrs. Murray Marshall, nee Sanders, and George Maston, both being natives of Oregon; but now residing in San Francisco.

The Oregon building and the various exhibits continue to attract the visitors in spite of the fact that many counties and states have spent much more money and time upon articles shown and particularly with fruits, in many cases show products superior to what we show but not better than we produce.

Our exhibits should be largely added to particularly new potatoes, summer apples, vegetables and fruits and new forage crops.

There are many callers daily from the east and south who desire information concerning the Willamette valley and there is no doubt that many of these enquirers will later visit our section and become residents on the land.

Earnest efforts to induce colonization are being made by many states and foreign countries. Montana, California, Idaho and Washington being particularly active while the exhibits from Argentine Republic, Austria, Canada, New Zealand, and the Central American countries are primarily designed and directed to this end.

Last night the Carmel Mission pageant was enacted as an outdoor play in the courts of the universe, some 400 participants making a brilliant spectacle portraying the actions of the early Spanish fathers in the establishment of the Christian faith upon this coast.

There is much at this wonderful exposition to attract and hold the interest of everyone.

The farmer has all machinery and appurtenances for the furtherance of his work to examine and discuss.

The dairyman may see the herd of 95 Holstein cows fed, handled and milked right upon the grounds and their products manufactured into condensed milk.

The horticulturalist may compare the products of his section with those raised elsewhere and by an exchange of methods often secure valuable ideas.

The education building is of great interest to many. The various governmental exhibits are gathered at great cost, shown and explained by experts from all parts of our country and are full of interest.

The botanical gardens are full of

every known plant and flower gathered from every garden of the globe, and astonish the beholder.

Hundreds of rare orchids from Asiatic and South American countries delight the eye.

The present month has been with out rain and mostly pleasant although several days were made extremely chilly by heavy fog.

Art Smith makes his daily flights ascending several thousand feet into the air and then doing his wonderful succession of somersaults while strapped tightly in his machine.
