Getting Ready for Big Game.

University of Oregon, Eugene, August 2.—Kincaid Field, the athletic grounds of the State University, will present a considerably changed appearance when the students return in the fall. The university administration is building new bleachers to accommodate the record crowds which are expected to attend the campus games this year, especially the Oregon O. A. C. game which will be played on the campus for the first time in eight years. A new fence will be built around the east end of the field, which will reduce its size somewhat by cutting off a hundred feet or so nearest to the new administration building, Johnson Hall. The old gate-house has been torn down and a new one will be built. All the old drains criss-crossing the field have been dug up and will be replaced in slightly different locations after the tiles are thoroughly cleaned. By this means it is expected that the University will be able to furnish a dry football arena in any kind of weather.

ODD ORGANIZATION OF HAY FEVER SNEEZERS

New York, Aug. 3.—P. F. Jerome, visited at his office, 125 East 27th street, and asked for an authentic statement concerning the U. S. Hay Fever Association, of which he is secretary, sneezed, called a stenographer, sneezed again, and dictated the following:

Rev. Guy Roberts is the president of the United States Hay Fever association, which meets in convention September 2 and 3 in the White Mountains of New Hampshire. Rev. Roberts was formerly the pastor of the large Methodist church in Bethlehem. He is active in promoting plans for the entertainment of the nearly three thousand hay fever victims who annually visit Bethlehem and Maplewood for relief from the onslaught of sneezing and weeping.

While Rev. Roberts is hailed as the "Main Sneezer" of the Hay Fever association, curiously enough he is not a "sneezer." For the first thirty-five years of this popular organization the office of the president was filled by a qualified veteran, Ex-President C. E. Delemater, of Newport, R. I., who preceded President Roberts, urged the convention to elect a successor who could preside over their deliberations without punctuating his remarks with sneezes. In the old days it was not unusual to declare a recess until the interrupting sneezers had quieted down.

The oldest sneezer on the records of the association was Mr. M. Richard Muckle, of Philadelphia, who died during the past year, at the age of 90, holding the record for 76 consecutive years of sneezing.
