A NEW COMMISSION.

Everybody will watch with interest the results of the hearings before the government's latest experiment, the International Trade Commission which will hold forth in the Northwest the next two weeks, says an Oregon writer.

It is announced that the commission will try and ascertain "what is the matter of commerce" between the United States and foreign ports and between trade centers of our own country.

It is really laughable to watch one of those high brow commissions sit in solemn conclave to discuss "what is the matter of commerce" when any smart school boy who has read the daily papers could show them in ten minutes how the same politicians who created this latest commission have created dozens of others like it which have so burdened industry with useless regulations that there is practically no commerce left to regulate.

So far all the commission has done has been to tell the manufacturers lumbermen and fruit growers what they "could not do" and they held up the development of foreign business at every turn. They have not advanced a single idea that would get a dollar's worth of business or maintain a single payroll.

They are supposed to "aid the manufacturer and producer in securing markets."

Watch them and see if they add enough business to the Northwest to pay the taxpayers for the expenses of their trip out here.

WILL TAKE \$20,000,000

It will require approximately \$20,000,000 to pay interest and principal on \$10,000,000 6 per cent 25-year highway bonds, assuming they are issued at the rate of \$2,000,000 a year for five years, and are amortized beginning the first year.

By expending one mill a year, raising \$1,000,000 from direct taxation for ten years, the same result in road construction would be achieved for a little over half the tax money that \$2,000,000 a year for five years would cost.

But we wouldn't get the roads so soon.

The question that will confront the voters when the road bond election is held a year hence will be:

Is it worth while to pay out 17,000,000 to \$9,000,000 extra for the sake of having \$10,000,000 spent on roads in five years instead of ten years?—Oregon Voter.
