CORVALLIS P. O. RECEIPTS CONTINUE CLIMBING UPWARD

Receipts of the Corvallis post office for the month of July this year were \$231.52, as against \$179.76 for July 1914, an increase of \$237.76, which is equivalent to 13 per cent increase. This is a record of which Corvallis is proud, especially in view of the fact that this large increase comes at a time when business generally is at a standstill and besides it is at a time of the year when the college is closed, and during the month there was neither convention nor any other gathering in the city to make for an increase. Corvallis has been doing this same kind of stunt for a number of years. When B. W. Johnson became postmaster his salary was about a hundred dollars a month and he was allowed \$600 for clerk hire. When he went out of office the postmaster received \$2600 salary and over \$6000 was allotted for clerk and carrier salaries. Since Postmaster Moses has been in office the increase has been similar, the postmaster's salary having been raised since he took the office.—Gazette-Times.

OSTEOPATHS CONSIDER SOME STREET CAR DRAWBACKS

Strap-hanging and High Steps Declared to Be Injurious to Our Anatomy.

Portland, Aug. 5.—High steps on the street cars and strap hanging are wrecking the anatomy of the American people, declared Dr. H. H. Fryette of the faculty of the Chicago College of Osteopathy at today's session of the international osteopathic convention. Dr. Fryette is an authority on the innominate bone and sacroiliac joint. These are two things which are displaced by the particular twist and strain produced in an attempt to mount street cars which have too high steps.

Strap hanging, particularly by women, is also denounced by Dr. Fryette as another of the undue strains not only upon this point, but on even more vital parts of the body. These two would not be so injurious to athletes, explained the speaker, but the average city dweller is not sufficiently developed muscularly to offset the strain of the joint in the particular extreme position required in such circumstances. Osteopathic physicians claim to have recorded many thousands of cases of this sort, a very large percentage of which are produced in this way.

The cure of catarrhal disease is now successfully performed by new osteopathic methods of finger surgery in the throat, according to Dr. James D. Edwards of St. Louis, who demonstrated his technique today.

Hay fever can often be cured by osteopathic adjustment by means of the finger in the throat, according to Dr. H. M. Goehring, of Pittsburgh, who reported a large number of cases which had responded to this new treatment.

LINN COUNTY MEN AT THE U. O. SUMMER SCHOOL

Among the Linn county students at the University of Oregon Summer school are P. E. Baker, Prentiss Brown, Fannie Chase and Fred Schepman. P. E. Baker's course includes education, English literature and administration of high school library. Prentiss Brown is taking work in teaching of English composition and education. Fannie Chase and Fred Schepman are working for the M. A. degree.

The Summer school this year is larger than ever before, and the Student Body is remarkable in several respects. In the first place, there are again as many men as women. This is very unusual in summer schools, which are, as a general thing composed to a very large extent of women school teachers. To men at it as a general thing, the Linn county students are working for the M. A. degree. The school, their average age is probably 30 years or more. They include numerous county and city superintendents and high school and consolidated school principals who are working for higher degrees and to advance themselves in their profession.

FORMER BREWERY NOW MAKES LOGANBERRY JUICE

Salem Brewery Has Been Transformed from Beer to Loju Factory.

The Loganberry as the foundation of the best drink in the market is fast coming to the front. This week the Northwest Fruit Products Co., of Salem, shipped a carload of the juice East to New York City, where it has been sold. In view of the great interest in the berry the following from the Salem Journal about how a brewery has been transformed into a loganberry juice, to be known as Loju, plant, is very interesting.

Today is "Loju" day in Salem. "Salem First," said the loganberry man, and in Salem today "Loju" loganberry juice was first placed on sale at the soda fountains. The Northwest Fruit Products company was floated on the crest of the first prohibition wave that swept Oregon at the last election and the Salem Brewing association plant was converted into a scientific establishment for the bottling and marketing of the coming beverage of the Willamette valley—loganberry juice; the drink which William Jennings Bryan characterized as "the cooling beverage which quenches the thirst yet brings no sorrow with it."

The Salem brewery was a modern up-to-date plant for the brewing of beer and much of the machinery has been utilized for the making and storing of loganberry juice. It was necessary, however, not only to secure considerable new machinery but even to have some of it made by special order as there is no loganberry juice machinery on the market. Some of the machinery for the manufacture of grape juice was used by the scientific handling of loganberry juice has brought forth a set of new problems which were to be solved by the pioneer manufacturers of the juice. Manager Schmidt, of the Northwest Fruit Products began experimenting with loganberry juice two years ago and was ready to begin actual work in a thorough manner.

It was necessary to silver plate the inside of many of the tanks and vats installed in the plant, however, and some of the new machinery purchased is silver lined throughout. This insures the juice to be free from any poisonous elements that might be communicated from the contact with iron. Even the pipes leading from one vat or tank to another are silver lined and are fitted with silver stop cocks. In the cooling room are huge tanks, glass lined, which were installed under the eye of a government inspector for the storage of beer. The temperature of this room is kept about six degrees below the freezing point. This chilly atmosphere absolutely precludes any possibility of fermentation and the juice is kept at this temperature until it is bottled and then the bottles with their air-tight caps are stored in cool cellars to await shipment.

The juice is analyzed for its sugar content and natural fruit acidity and in the chill temperature of 25 degrees is standardized for a normal product. No guess work goes. All of the elements of the natural fruit juice are known to the smallest percentage to the trained experts who prepare it and trained men are even now experimenting with advanced methods for perfecting the product. Every process is on a strictly scientific basis, sanitary and thorough. Inch by inch, every necessary move from the time the ripe, fresh fruit is unloaded on the platform until it is put in the bottle ready for shipment, has been worked out in the best and most economical manner. The clear, rich colored juice absolutely free from all artificial coloring, with its thirst quenching possibilities is indicative of the scientific manner in which it has been prepared.

Two qualities, or varieties of the juice were put on the market today, the beverage and the concentrated juice. The beverage is ready to drink from the bottle, and is of exactly the same consistency as the standard grape juice. The concentrated form is the pure juice of the loganberry and sugar with a percentage of the natural water content removed by natural means. This latter form is for the use of confectioners, more particularly, and for more convenience in shipping.

The men behind the loganberry juice industry are confident that there is a great future for the industry and that its popularity will keep pace with its introduction into other fields. The plant will use a stated amount of loganberries each year and guarantees a certain price to the growers to insure the best and most select berries for making the juice.

Sample cartoons containing a bottle of the concentrated juice and a bottle

of the beverage have been prepared and will be shipped to any listed dealer whose name and address is sent in to the plant. This is to be used as a means of introducing the juice into other localities where the loganberry is little known.

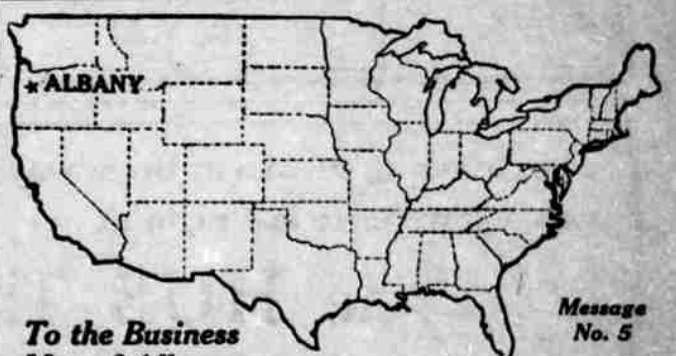
