THREE DISTRICTS COMBINE FOR NEW SCHOOL AT HOLLY

Residents of the Holly and Crawfordville districts were in the city today attending the hearing before the county boundary board regarding the new Union High school district No. 103, recently voted out of districts 56, 104 and 106. The vote was close, resulting in 47 in favor to 44 opposed to the consolidation.

Residents of the Holly district are highly pleased over the result of their efforts, for now they may proceed and erect a building and conduct a school worthy of the rich district that it represents. There are \$2,000,000 worth of taxable property in the three districts, \$1,500,000 of which is in the Holly district.

School Controversy—

The county boundary board, consisting of the county court and Supt. Jackson, heard the testimony in the dispute between Sodaville and Waterloo school districts over the division of territory in these districts.
