AIR FIGHTS.

Whatever his motive he is forcing the Pan American nations to take a hand in settling matters for the country. Our country very properly has pursued a waiting policy, as it was the business of the United States to do. There is a time, though, when patience ceases to be a virtue, and that time seems to be about here. If President Wilson does enter seriously into the game of Mexican government he will do it right, and only as an extremity.
