LIFE INSURANCE MEN DISCUSS YEAR'S LOSSES

San Francisco, Aug. 10.—While we stand appalled by the enormous loss of life and treasure which has been going on in Europe in the past twelve months, we should not forget the victims of the deadly conflict constantly going on in our own peaceful land," declared President Hugh M. Willet to the National Association of Life Underwriters in convention here today.

"Statistics tell us that 650,000 lives are annually destroyed in the United States by diseases of the preventable class. The annual economic loss from this source is estimated at \$1,500,000,000, or six times the amount of our fire loss. While there has been in re-

cent years an awakening of the public conscience as to its duty in this matter, the work of improvement has hardly begun. The time is now ripe for our insurance forces to press forward in this great movement, not only to make life longer in this country, but to make it more livable."

The delegates were welcomed by President Moore of the exposition, and Mayor Rolph. Speakers today included Warren M. Horner, William L. Hathaway, and Hubert H. Ward. Topics were: "Getting Prospects," "Cultivating Prospects," "Closing Prospects," and "Getting Settlements."

A special life insurance exhibit on the exposition grounds interested the delegates, one feature being a mill grinding out silver dollars to show the amount contributed by policyholders in the way of insurance taxes.

DENTISTS WILL HOLD NATIONAL CONVENTION AT FAIR

San Francisco, August 10.—From August 30 to September 9, the largest dental congress ever held will be in session in the Civic Auditorium in San Francisco. Committees for the Pan-Pacific Dental Congress are now arranging the details for the big gathering. Meeting with the congress will be the International Dental Association, and the following dental fraternities: Delta Sigma Delta, Xi Psi Phi and Psi Omega.

Attending the congress will be representatives of sixteen foreign countries and every state in the Union will send delegates. Dentists throughout the United States, who are not members of the congress, are urged

by the committee to join and attend the sessions in San Francisco. A splendid program, covering every branch of dental work and including international authorities in the different branches, has been arranged.

Word has just been received at the headquarters of the congress here that the government of Guatemala has appointed two well known men to attend the congress and these delegates will collect data for a comprehensive report to their government on the work accomplished at the congress.

Monday, September 6, has been set aside as Dental Congress Day at the exposition. A special program will be given on that day in Festival Hall, one of the features of which will be an address on the development of dentistry as an exact science and the relation of dentistry to physical and mental well-being.

NATIONAL FORESTS FURNISH \$2,500,000 ANNUAL INCOME

Portland, Aug. 10.—The National Forests turned into the U. S. treasury during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1915, nearly \$2,500,000, an increase of more than \$400,000 over the receipts of the previous year, according to a statement just issued by the Forest Service. The timber sales, which amounted to \$1,164,000 yielded on account of the depressed condition of the lumber industry about \$79,000 less than those of the previous fiscal year, but the gain was made possible by larger revenues from other sources. The grazing receipts, which totaled \$1,125,000, increased over last year, and the water power receipts, which amounted to not quite \$90,000, showed an increase of nearly \$42,000.

The demoralization of the turpentine industry on account of the war's curtailment of the naval stores market caused the receipts from the sale of turpentine privileges on the national forests to drop to about \$9,000, as against nearly \$15,000 last year. Thistle of special use permits, under which all sorts of enterprises, from apiculture to whaling stations, are operated on the forests, yielded nearly \$28,000, an increase of \$9,000 over last year. There was a decrease of nearly \$37,000 in the revenue derived by the settlement of trespass cases in which government timber had been cut without intent to defraud, the revenue from this source being only a little more than \$3,000. More than \$7,000, however, was collected from other timber trespass cases. Grazing trespass cases yielded nearly \$6,000, an increase of about \$1,000; occupancy trespass cases, which occurred in only one of the seven forest districts, turned in something less than \$250; about \$60 was derived from turpentine trespass cases, and \$600 from fire trespass cases, the latter being more than \$7,000 less than the amount collected in the previous fiscal year for damage to government property through fires carelessly or wilfully started in or near national forests.

Much Metal in Dodge.

Vast quantities of metals are used in the manufacture of the modern motor car. In Dodge Bros' foundry, over 90,000 pounds of gray iron alone is cast daily to keep pace with the big schedule of production. Approximately 250 cylinder castings are turned out every twenty-four hours, and hundreds of other smaller parts used in the motor are being manufactured simultaneously.

Sun Eclipse Today But Few See It.

Boston, Aug. 10.—Although there is an eclipse of the sun today, few persons on the earth will notice it. No part of the eclipse is visible from the United States and, in fact, with the exception of small parts of China and Siberia, there is no land where the sun will be seen to be eclipsed. The region over which it can be seen covers almost the entire Pacific Ocean. The moon will pass before the sun over the area, but will not be large enough to cover the entire disc.

National Banks Lose U. S. Deposits.

Washington, Aug. 10.—The withdrawal today by the treasury department of \$3,097,500 from its deposits in national banks throughout the country foreshadows the withdrawal gradually of all Federal deposits in national banks, except working balances for various government accounts. Previously, five millions had been withdrawn this summer. The withdrawals are part of the plan of the treasury department to encourage the Federal Reserve system. Over forty millions more are on deposit in national banks. The banks have been paying two per cent interest on the government deposits, and this will be lost to the treasury department.
