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ENORMOUS BALANCES.

Prophecies based on facts and figures say that the trade balance in favor of the United States for the present fiscal year will probably reach \$2,000,000,000, and may exceed that figure by many millions, says a financial paper. The facts are significant since the excess of exports over imports in June 1915 was \$110,800,000 as compared to the corresponding month of 1914 when exports were less than imports by \$6,500,000. In only one June in ten years had exports exceeded imports by as much as \$30,000,000.

Reports have been issued on about 90 per cent of the world's commerce for the week ending July 24, and show a balance in favor of the United States of \$22,900,000, bringing the balance for the month, up to July 24 to \$57,000,000. Few crops are moving in June and July and there is so little activity in exports that these are considered very quiet months. What then, may be reasonably expected when the wheat crop of the United States, estimated at 400,000,000 bushels, begins to move in the fall? The only dubious phase of the bright outlook is the possibility of a shortage of ships, though that is not expected. By fall the shipment of war munitions will be going steadily forward, wheat, cotton and other crops will be in shipment, and the United States will celebrate the reaping of the war's great harvest.
