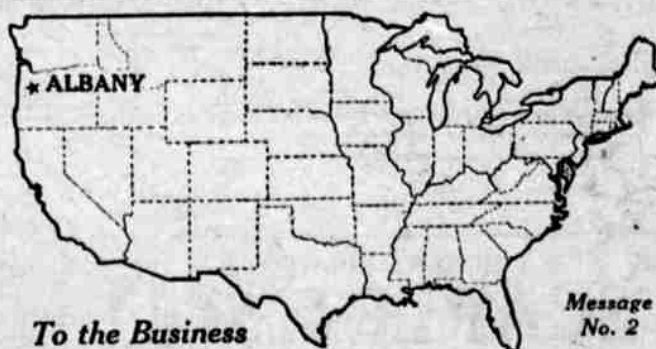

### STUNG ON A CHEAP PRICE WITH CHEAP GOODS

Linn County Man Learns That It Is Cheaper to Pay More at Home For Better Goods.

That it pays to patronize local firms and confine ones buying to home concerns, is demonstrated by the following: A letter to a local garage from a Portland vulcanizing house. A Linn county man, allured by attractive advertising bought a tire from a Portland house at a price far below the price of ordinary tires. The tire has been on the car but a short time and is now ripped on the tread, badly cut up and cracked and the bead is blown off for about a foot at one place. The tire is now in the garage and the following letter tells the story:

Albany, Oregon:  
Gentlemen: In regard to the Revere casing referred to, allow us to say that the Revere has to be handled differently than other tires, especially now, that they are all aged. The Revere factory has been closed down for several years. Some of the tires that are now being sold at bargain prices are as much as seven years old. The tire you refer to is worthless. It cannot be repaired. The owner of the tire was probably allured by the cut price, and took a chance. He gambled and lost. The other fellow won. He won because he never expects to sell the same party the second time.

There are probably two or three other dealers in Albany; they're there to stay. Albany owners had better let the home dealers look after their tires.

### BENSON DAY WILL BE TUESDAY THE 17TH

Then Great Honor Will Be Done Oregon's Great Philanthropist and Booster.

San Francisco, Aug. 12.—The strenuous Teddy came to the exposition and was accorded all the honor due his station and service. His antithesis, the dove-like William J., also came, and he received no lesser courtesy, besides being given a drink of loganberry juice. Now comes Simon Benson, Oregon's most distinguished citizen, and he, like the other conquering heroes, is to be given the best the exposition has in stock. August 17 is the date on which Mr. Benson and Oregon will be honored, and it is certain that Benson Day at the exposition will go down in history as the greatest of the great. You see, California recently spent eighteen million dollars in one lump on good roads, and has spent treble that amount at various and sundry times heretofore. When the Californians discovered that the Oregonians selected for a special day at the exposition had been spending much of his time and money for the very thing that most interested them—good roads—they immediately threw their hats into the air and determined to show the world just exactly how the earnest good roads advocate should ever be treated by the state and nation. When they learned that Mr. Benson is now fathering a movement to bond the state of Oregon for \$10,000,000 to complete and maintain a system of first-class highways, they immediately decided that the exposition officials should don their silk tiles and with gaily decorated autos meet him on his arrival and parade him through the grounds just like they did Mr. Roosevelt. Then they became acquainted with the fact that this same Mr. Benson has spent thousands of dollars investigating good roads and through assistance employed for this purpose alone gives this information to the public without cost: That he also gave \$10,000 spot cash to build a road around Shell Rock; that he now serves as chairman of the advisory committee to the state highway commission. This caused them to enlarge on that parade and determine that gold braid and brass buttons in gorgeous array should add military dignity and inspiration, and that there should be elaborate exercises in the Court of Abundance, the most beautiful of all the courts at the exposition. And when the officials finally got onto the fact that Mr. Benson really fathered the Columbia River Highway, the greatest scenic automobile road in the United States, that he then purchased the bonds for much of its construction, then enlisted the support of the automobile association of California, representing 6,000 machines, that organization took hold of the matter with a hearty good will, determined that the parade on Benson Day shall be more elaborate than any heretofore or yet to come, and went the limit by arranging for a banquet at night that is expected to eclipse anything ever attempted in the Golden Gate City. When Oregon friends added the information that Mr. Benson had built a million dollar hotel in Portland, had given the city forty magnificent bubbling drinking fountains, has recently given the Portland School of Trades \$100,000, and that during the past several years his philanthropies have been many but modestly kept from the public, these same exposition officials agreed that Governor Withycombe's committee of nine had indeed selected one of the greatest of the great, one whom the exposition would be delighted to honor in the most elaborate way possible. President Moore added that, in addition to all the things mentioned heretofore, he desired to give Mr. Benson a luncheon, and at the special exercises in the Court of Abundance would present him with a commemorative medal.
