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Carried 37,000,000 Passengers Without a Single One Being Killed By Accident.

The Southern Pacific company closed the fiscal year ending June 30, 1914, without a single passenger having been killed in a train accident on its lines.

During that period the company carried 37,000,000 passengers. It operated 10,000 miles of track (Pacific system).

It ran 52,000 passenger trains every month or 624,000 during the year. It carried 3700 passengers per mile of track operated.

In 1913 the Southern Pacific in competition was awarded the Harriman memorial medal for being the safest American railroad. Since 1908 it has carried over eight billion passengers a distance of one mile, with but one fatality in a train accident. The latter occurred early in 1904 at Lone and was caused by defective equipment on a foreign line car. A chart prepared in the office of chairman of the executive committee, Julius Kruttschnitt, shows the progress being made by the company in minimizing the number of train accidents. In the fiscal year just closed there were 76 per cent less train accidents than in 1905 and 70 per cent less injuries.

CONTINUES TO KNOCK ALBANY AND HER BUSINESS MEN

The Scio Tribune continues to knock Albany. In reference to the Bryan Chautauqua lecture here it says:

"Hundreds and perhaps thousands would have gladly heard Mr. Bryan, but they refused to be held by the Albany crowd for 50 cents. It was, also, a noticeable fact that almost the entire crowd who heard Mr. Bryan were people who lived outside of Albany. The impression is out that Albany's only value of Mr. Bryan is the four-bit pieces he could earn for them."

The "hold-uppers" are as honorable a company of business men as there are in Oregon; the Chautauqua board, Bryan was simply an added Chautauqua attraction. He is noted as a Chautauqua lecturer, and charged here the same as at other Chautauquas.

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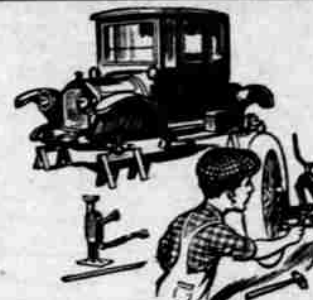
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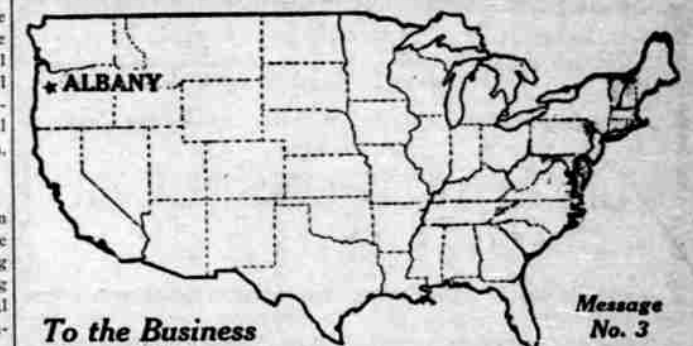
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
