Gold Hill—Rogue River Public service corporation preparing to resume work on plant here.

Eugene—Contract awarded to Clark & Henry Const. Co., for paving of Alder St., at \$173 per cu. yd. or \$32,915. Pavement to be 24 feet wide, 5 in. conc. base, 2-in gravel bitulithic wearing surface.
