OUR FOREIGNERS.

An argument being used for national defense is that there are fourteen million foreigners, not yet citizens, in the United States, who in case of war with their fatherlands, would be on that side at once, and hence a menace to our safety. This, of course, is far-fetched. Of these a good many are women, and the actual number who would be a dangerous element is not large, mostly found in the larger cities. Most of the foreign element in this country would be loyal to the United States. They came here because they wanted to get away from their own country, with its institutions, a great many of them because opposed to militarism and others for different reasons; but all of them because they preferred the United States to any other country. Some may have become dissatisfied here, and there are some anarchists around; but the bulk of foreigners as we meet them are loyal to our country, and would probably be so if it came to an issue, no matter how much they may now very naturally sympathize with their fatherland.

SHOULD BE CAREFUL.

Already a number of hunting accidents have been reported. One resulted fatally, another was of a serious character. Both were no doubt the result of carelessness. Most gun accidents are. The lover of good sport cannot be blamed for hunting for deer, one of the most intensely interesting and exciting of all game sports; but the public has a right to demand that he should use all the care it is possible for one to exercise.

PROBLEM FOR ASSESSORS.

It has been assessed, or other property like it, at about \$16 an acre; but under the decision of the supreme court it can be sold for only \$2.50 an acre, and certainly the owner cannot be assessed for more than he can sell the property. Some of the assessors insist that they can assess at full value, according to the law, regardless of what the company may get for the property.
