It is said that Marguerite, Countess of Blessington, a famous beauty, society leader, and novelist, to whom Byron wrote his last poem—wore the first side laced shoe. After her husband's death, the income from her lands began to dwindle, and her extravagances (among which was entertaining) made it necessary for her to cut down her personal expenses. She dispensed with her maid, among other things, and found it very difficult to lace her shoes, so she requested her shoemaker to place the laces at the side to make them more accessible. She started the fashion, then Elsie Janis revived it, today. The first illustration is Countess Blessington's shoe, the second, the shoe of today, in all its grace and beauty.

"WILDFIRE" A GREAT PLAY AT THE GLOBE TONIGHT

Tonight at the Globe theatre will be seen Lillian Russell, one of America's foremost actresses in the great Broadway drama, "Wildfire." With Miss Russell, who in private life is Mrs. Walter Moore, is Lionel Barrymore, and a strong Shubert cast. The story of Wildfire follows:

Bob Barrington conducts a racing stable on Long Island without the knowledge of his daughters, Henrietta and Myrtle. Barrington is traveling in the west and meets John Keefe, a gambler. John Garrison comes east and sees Henrietta and thinks he recognizes in her a striking resemblance to the picture found in the watch of the dead man. Keefe and Garrison meet at the home of Henrietta. Keefe denies his identity, but betrays himself. Garrison sends west for the watch and the missing sheet of the bill of sale. He loses the watch and it is found by a street beggar and pawned. Henrietta is attracted by it in the window and buys it. She overhears Keefe tell Donovan that he bought the stable of her father and confronts him with the watch and picture. While playing tennis with Henrietta the missing sheet of the bill of sale falls from the pocket of Garrison and she finds it and the mystery deepens. She overhears a conversation between Keefe and Gorman and finds the complete bill of sale and compares it with the missing sheet.

Ralph Woodhurst, the fiancé of Myrtle has been induced by Keefe to bet large sums at his pool room. The day of the big handicap is approaching and Wildfire, in the Keefe stable, is being backed to win. Keefe sends Donovan to rob Henrietta of the missing sheet but fails. Henrietta on the day of the big race, seeks out John Garrison, and accuses him of being in collusion with Keefe or Duffy. She shows Garrison her proofs. Keefe realizes that he must flee the country. He backs another horse to win, bribes Chappy Raster, the rider of Wildfire, to use the whip on the mare to cause her to balk. Henrietta overhears the plot and goes to the office where she has a terrific struggle with Keefe. She succeeds in pulling down the flag and the story closes with Henrietta in the arms of her lover, Wildfire having won the race.
