LARGEST INCREASE IN SAFETY DEVICES FOR THE RAILROADS

In One Year Southern Pacific System Increased Number Thirty Per Cent.

The Stockton Division, the Shasta Division and the Sacramento Shops are winners of the 1915 safety banners awarded annually by the Southern Pacific Company for the greatest progress shown during the fiscal year in the furtherance of safety work on the Pacific system. Thus, the Stockton Division wins the honors of the Southern District, the Shasta ranks highest in the Northern, and the Sacramento shops top the list in the general shops competition.

This makes the second banner won by both the Stockton and Shasta divisions and the third by the Sacramento general shops. In 1913 the Coast Division won the Central District banner, and the San Joaquin the Southern district banner. In 1914 the Salt Lake division won the Northern district emblem.

During the year ended June 30, 1915, there was a total of 3228 safety suggestions submitted by employees, 3768 of which, or 71 per cent, were considered practical and were favorably acted upon by the superintendents. As employees have no doubt noted from the perusal of meetings of the safety committees, these suggestions have covered a wide range of subjects in every department of the railroad, and have resulted in the adoption of safeguards of every description—the correction of defects, and the issuance of instructions looking to the betterment of conditions under which employees work—many at the expense of thousands of dollars.

During the last twelve months a decided increase in interest has been shown by the safety committees and employees, there having been an increase of 30 per cent in the total number as compared with the preceding year, and an increase of 96 per cent over 1913.

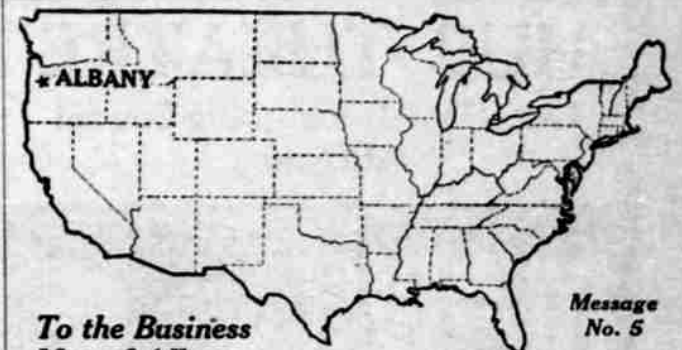
