AMERICAN HOME ECONOMICS ASSOCIATION ON FOOD BUYING

Dinner Makers Discuss Problems Relating to Serving Foods at Minimum Cost.

Seattle, Aug. 21.—The teaching of textiles in the public schools as the means of effecting economies was urged before the annual convention of the American Home Economics association here today. Miss Nellie Crooks, of the Milwaukee-Nellie college detailed the aims of textile teaching and the good it would accomplish.

Home economics and efficiency was the subject of an interesting address by Miss Alice Ravenhill, former government expert for British Columbia.

Big Dental Congress.

San Francisco, Aug. 23.—Fifteen thousand dollars has been set aside by the Panama-Pacific Dental Congress for the entertainment of delegates to the big congress, which meets in San Francisco from August 30 to September 9, inclusive. Delegates to the number of several hundred have already arrived and advice received each day are showing a big increase over what it was expected would attend. Word just received is to the effect that a delegation numbering 1700 has left from the Tokio Dental College of Tokyo, Japan, to attend the congress.
