TWO ALBANY MEN ON STAFF OF ADMIRAL WILSON

Astoria's Big Regatta Begins
September 2; Mrs. R. S. Shaw
Is Candidate For Queen.

Astoria, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special to Democrat).—Two former Albany men have been honored with places on the staff of Admiral Wilson, of Portland, commander-in-chief of Astoria's 20th annual regatta, which opens in this city on September 2 for three days. They are Robert S. Shaw, manager of the Hammond Lumber company, and Leland R. Gilbert, night editor of the Morning Astorian. Both men rank as captains.

The program for the regatta this year is nearly completed and the event promises to be the best ever staged in the metropolis of the Lower Columbia. Aeroplane flights, balloon races, power boat races, athletic contests of every kind, and countless other attractions will be furnished.

Among the prominent contestants for Queen of the Regatta this year is Mrs. Robert S. Shaw, well known in Albany.

Chairman Harley of the regatta committee today received word from Governor Withycombe that the United States cruiser South Dakota has been ordered here for regatta week. Besides the South Dakota, the U. S. cruiser Albany, will also be in the harbor as an added attraction.

Special rates will be granted on all railroads during the regatta week and a fine time is promised all who attend.

Already Astoria is gay in a dress of blue and white, these being the official regatta colors and all will be in readiness for the opening day.

Great Crops.

EUGENE'S AUTO INVESTMENT.

\$117,000 Paid for Autos and \$16,000 for Gasoline in One Valley town this Year.

According to a Eugene paper 160 motor cars have been sold this year to Eugene and Lane county people by local dealers. The aggregate amount paid by the purchasers was between \$17,000 and \$125,000.

During the present season more than \$16,161.80 has been spent for gasoline in Eugene. A part of this has been sold to tourists but the most of it has been used by Lane county car owners.

Garage men and dealers generally say that business during the last eight months has been better than during the same period in 1914.
