LISS'S MINT MILL IS GETTING BIG REPUTATION

Oregonian Devotes Three Columns, With Illustrations to the Industry.

That Linn county's mint mill is becoming celebrated is manifest from a three column illustrated article covering the industry, in Sunday's Oregonian. It was written by W. L. Marks with pictures from photographs taken by him.

This year forty-one and a half acres of mint are being harvested and made into mint. The average profit is said to be \$98 an acre. Next year it is proposed to increase the acreage to one hundred. As there is very little mint grown in the United States the industry here is of importance. The other states raising it are Michigan and Indiana. The statement is made that the Oregon mint tests 15 per cent higher than the mint of those states, and contains 25 per cent more menth-

It is placed in a vat, and steam forced through it, coming out from the vat through a series of condensing pipes on which cold water flows, with the water from the condensed steam the oil flowing out, when it is skimmed off. The straw is afterwards used for feed for stock. Forty to forty-five pounds of oil to the acre is secured. It is worth \$2 to \$5 a pound. Linn county men now having small mint fields are E. B. To give the word "Prosperity" its full meaning and to prove that America's vast business institutions are as solid as Gibraltar, noted men of the electrical industry, representing investments of nearly \$2,000,000,000 met in New York recently and decided to back a nation wide campaign to brighten up and cheer up every city and town in America. A period of general celebration when "White Ways," electric parades, speech making and expressions of good will one to another in every business in the land will take place Nov. 29 to Dec. 4 during "Electrical Prosperity Week."

The United States, the business men declare, is the one great nation on earth basking in peace and prosperity and the enjoyments these blessings bring. Yet calamity howlers try to spread discontent and misery by crying "hard times." The unified action of great industries, led by the electrical men, is intended to still the shrill voices of these business crows and give to very man and woman complete evidence that our country, under circumstances of war and its horrors abroad, has every reason to support and be proud of its industry and commerce.

The campaign has been entrusted for the society for electrical development of New York City, the foremost organization of its character in the world, the society whose slogan "Do It Electrically" has in a very brief space of time become the most wide known dictum in the business world. A staff of experienced business experts and writers has been selected to aid in disseminating the gospel of cheer.

To bring into every town and city in America the benefits of the movement the society and its members have divided the sections of the union into electrical "states," in which special committees of leading business men will direct the progress of the campaign. Each district will have its special celebrations. Throughout the country on 10,000 great bill boards, in the newspapers, magazines, trade papers, by postal letter, pamphlet, books and lectures the doctrine of "think well of your country and the blessings she enjoys" will be spread in language so clear that all will understand.

To cooperate in sowing the seeds of "good business means happy homes," the electrical industries have been pledged the active cooperation of allied organizations of capital. It is planned to illuminate every store, club, hotel, business place and even the homes in the cities. It is the aim of the men who conceived the mighty uplift movement to bring home to people that America alone has not suffered by the world's tragedy abroad; that business is better than in years, that he have nothing to do with the war and that we are entitled to glory in the achievements of peace of the United States. These men plan to convert the pessimist into an optimist, the grumbler into a patriot and the "little" man in every walk of life into a factor in the broad legion of American citizenship.

The schools, the churches, the stores, the great industrial plants and factories, the street cars, vehicles,—every element of activity will be urged to join in making "Electrical Prosperity Week" an astonishing national movement to rehabilitate the dubious minds of men and women who do not believe in their country's growth, its ability to take care of itself or its amazing prosperity under the "wars and rumors of wars" abroad.

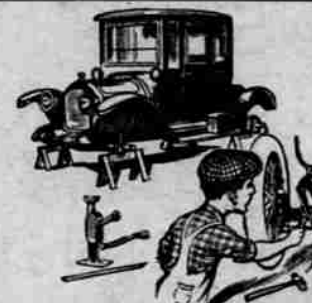
