EVANGELIST SAYS PERILOUS

(Continued from Page 1).

12, that the wickedness had gone so far back in Noah's time that it was said of the mthar "every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only

evil continually" and that the earth was filled with violence. What better picture could we find of the conditions today than is here given?

In the 59th chapter of Isa. the 12th to the 15th verse we find another prediction of the present day which tells us exactly what we see today in our

court system. Thousands of criminals every year but very few brought to justice and made to pay the penalty. Yes, said the evangelist, even as the prophet Isaiah foretold, "Judgment is turned away backward, and justice standeth afar off: for truth is fallen in the street, and equity cannot enter." In 1912 it was pointed out that before the year was over about 10,000 criminals would commit murder in this country, but only 116 would be brought to justice.

The findings of the Lexow committee of New York city, appointed by the state senate of New York, in their seventy sittings, the report of which was given in the five volumes of 1500 pages each, disclose the rottenness of the justice which is given through the police system of our large cities.

"It is no wonder then that the Apostle Paul in 2 Tim. 3:1-5 in describing the conditions in the last days says that "perilous times shall come," and in five short verses he describes what makes the times in which we live perilous. He said as we find by reading the Revised Version, that "Because men shall be lovers of self, lovers of money, boasters, haughty, retailers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affection, implacable, slanderers, without self-control, fierce, no lovers of good, traitors, hedy, puffed up, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God; having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof," that the times in which we may find these conditions manifest are perilous and that we are in the last days.

The speaker spoke at some length of the way men of the poorer and richer classes alike are lovers of money above everything else today. In speaking of Rockefeller's wealth the speaker said that if Mr. Rockefeller had lived since the days of Jesus and had laid away a dollar an hour from that time to this he would just about have the wealth which he is said to possess at the present time.

He then closed by alluding to the form of godliness which we see in the religious world today. Surely we have come to the time spoken of here, and also in the 4th chapter of this same book and spoken of again in the 30th chapter of Isa. as a time when they would not endure sound doctrine but would call for smooth things to be given to them, something that will not show them their sinfulness. Surely the Lord must and will come to put an end to this reign of lawlessness and sin for He said in Matt. 24:33 that when ye shall see all these things, know that it is near even at the doors.

THREE MEN KILLED BY EXPLOSION OF DYNAMITE

Seven Thousand Pounds Went Off Near Oakland, Shattering a Train.

Oakland, Aug. 31.—Three men were instantly killed and one seriously injured when two cars of a train train carrying seven thousand pounds of dynamite exploded at Hercules. The men killed were Harold Bennett, engineer of the train; Bert Talbot, fireman, and laborer, unidentified. They were literally blown to pieces. The explosion came without warning. Portions of the men's anatomy were scattered broadcast.
